Arbor Day ceremonies, an Open House including tour, and a Dedication are all planned to officially mark the opening of the Station's Campus Warehouse on Friday, April 27 beginning at 3 p.m. at the Warehouse. All employees are invited to attend. Director Plane has been invited to say a few words, and Assemblyman Frank Talomie and Senator Paul Kehoe, both of whom had a lot to do with the Station getting this facility, have been invited to participate in the official ribbon-cutting ceremonies. The Station's Arboretum Committee is working diligently with Tom DeYulio and the Greenhouse and Grounds crew in designing an appropriate landscaping program for around the building. There will be a treeplanting ceremony, a free plant give-away sponsored by the Arboreutum Association which is especially fitting since it is Arbor Day. Construction was completed on the more than 13,000 square foot warehouse some months ago, but it has taken considerable time to add shelving and ready the building to accept materials.

Manning the warehouse will be Charlie D'Amico from Buildings and Properties. As materials are brought in, they will be inventoried as to their location and notations made in a computer program recently written by Ed Broderick of the Station's Computer Center. ## GUS CURTISS APPOINTED ASSISTANT SAFETY COORDINATOR FOR STATION

Gus Curtiss, Buildings and Properties, has been appointed assistant safety coordinator for the Station effective immediately. "Such a move makes logical sense," commented Pat Krauss, Administration, safety coordinator for the Station. "Many of the safety related items have to be corrected by Buildings and Properties personnel, so it is natural for someone from that unit to be deeply involved with assisting in coordinating the safety program at the Station. Gus is this kind of dedicated person who ranks safety matters in both the home and work place very high on his list of priorities. He has developed a good working rapport with Life Safety personnel from Ithaca. These individuals are responsible for making monthly safety inspections of Station buildings, primarily related to fire safety. Gus is particularly well attuned to correcting any deficiencies we might have in these areas with his strong background as a volunteer fireman in Bellona. We have worked well as a team in the past with Gus essentially serving in this capacity, so now we are formalizing the appointment." Both Gus and Pat will work on various safety items with Pat being responsible for general safety coordination activities including matters related to Right-to-Know, environmental health, and pesticides. Gus will concentrate on correcting fire safety deficiencies in buildings, continuing as chief fire warden for the Station, and assisting in running training schools on how to handle fire extinguishers and the like.

#### SAFETY ISSUES ADDRESSED BY COMMITTEE

A number of safety issues were discussed and resolved at a recent meeting of the Station's Safety Committee. Dave Soderlund, zone supervisor for radiation safety at Geneva, and Dave Lasher, Buildings and Properties, are going to be working with Ithaca officials to develop the best method of reporting and recording any accidents occurring at Geneva involving radiation materials.

Employees are reminded that Al Meaden, Food Science and Technology, is in charge of coordinating activities related to disposing of laboratory chemical wastes and Marty VanKirk, Jr., Field Research Unit, has the same responsibility for pesticide wastes. Both programs depend heavily on cooperation from Cornell Life Safety for eventual disposal of these chemicals.

A Station safety policy was enacted by the Committee which requires prior approval by appropriate Buildings and Properties personnel before any alterations can be made to an office or laboratory that necessitate anything being fastened to the building. Examples of such requests would be for laboratory benching, shelving, and the like.

All research departments, plus some of the units, have a sign-in book for those who need to work in offices and laboratories after hours. The sign-in procedure is mandatory policy for the Station. Director Plane will be notified of those people who do not sign in. Also, the Safety Committee reminds employees that should they be working in a laboratory after hours using a potentially dangerous procedure, someone else should be alerted about where they are and what they are doing. If this is not possible, the work should be put off until regular working hours when other people will be around.
