



2016-2017 Hu Shih Distinguished Lecture By Francesca Bray

Professor of Social Anthropology at University of Edinburgh; President of the International Society for the History of Technology

As the mainstream history of technology shifts its focus from innovation and the teleologies of modernity to maintenance and meaning, Francesca Bray discusses the attractive opportunities both for reembedding technology into Chinese history and for re-embedding China into the history of technology.

Francesca Bray is a historian and anthropologist of technology, science, and medicine. She has worked at the Needham Research Institute in Cambridge, the Centre National de la Recherche Scientifique in Paris, the Centre for the History of Science, Technology and Medicine at the University of Manchester, UCLA, and UC Santa Barbara, and is now Professor of Social Anthropology at the University of Edinburgh. In 2015-16 Dr. Bray was President of the Society for the History of Technology (SHOT) and as Past President she continues to work towards making SHOT and the mainstream, US-centred history of technology that the organization represents more truly international, not just socially but also intellectually.
