Current Data on the Indonesian Military Elite

September 1, 1993-August 31, 1994

The Editors

The present shorter listing shows the holders of key positions in the Armed Forces head-quarters and the army central and regional commands since September 1, 1993, the terminal date of our last complete listing (*Indonesia* 56, October 1993), to August 31, 1994. As we can see in the table below, there were two major waves of personnel changes in this period, the first in January mainly in the Armed Forces headquarters and the second larger one in August in the army. (A minor reshuffle in April in the Armed Forces headquarters was related to changes in the navy.) There was also an important institutional development in January: the powerful and ubiquitous intelligence apparatus, BAIS ABRI (Armed Forces Strategic Intelligence Agency) was liquidated and replaced by a less powerful millitary intelligence agency, BIA (Armed Forces Intelligence Agency). As early as January next year, however, we expect another wave of personnel changes, involving key positions in the army central command and some of Java's four regional commands, to ease out now troubled presidential brother-in-law, Army Chief-of-Staff Gen. Wismojo Arismunandar. This is the reason to publish this shorter list for now and wait for a year to do our next complete listing.

The military situation has been volatile as attested by waves of reshuffles every half a year over the last two years. (Major reshuffles took place in August 1992, April 1993, August 1993, January 1994, and August 1994.) As we noted in our last listing, this volatility is directly related to long simmering conflicts between President Soeharto and many senior army officers. The struggle manifested itself in this period most notably in the contest for control of Golkar, leading to Soeharto's imposition of his candidate, civilian minister of information Harmoko, as its chairman. In its wake, Maj. Gen. R.K. Sembiring Meliala openly expressed his unhappiness, saying in an interview with the now banned *DeTik* that "without President Soeharto's mandate Harmoko and Habibie are nothing" and that "they will vanish when the President is no longer in power." As Lt. Gen. Harsudiono Hartas, who as Armed Forces Chief for Social and Political Affairs, forced Soeharto's hand in the selection of Gen. Try Sutrisno as his Vice-President in March 1993, pointedly remarked, "There is no smoke without fire, what Sembiring said represents the silent majority [of military officers]."² The sacking of Lt. Gen. Hariyoto as Armed Forces Chief for the Social and Political Staff resulted directly from this showdown, for he resisted Harmoko's election as Golkar chairman, reportedly without Armed Forces Commander Feisal Tanjung's approval.

As a result of the long-simmering conflicts between the President and senior officers and Soeharto's adroit politicking, the army is now deeply divided. As noted earlier (*Indonesia* 55, April 1993; 56, October 1993), Gen. Edy Sudradjat in his brief days of "record" glory as simultaneously Minister of Defense, Armed Forces Commander, and Army Chief-of-Staff, made strategic appointments to assure colonels and brigadier generals that "army institutional rationality" would not be interfered with by the President. Since then, however, palace countermeasures have been going on in waves of reshuffles. This is the reason, we believe, that Harsudiono Hartas reportedly made a distinction between "loyalists" and "Sapta Margaists" in an informal discussion early this year.³

The palace, however, sees the ongoing struggle differently. In its perpective, it is taking place neither between the President and the army nor between "loyalists" and "Sapta Margaists," but between the President and his one-time military chief turned nemesis, retired Gen. Benny Murdani. But the palace is unsure how deeply "contaminated" the officer corps is.⁴ They thought Edy was "professional," but to their dismay he allowed Benny to retain his office in the BAIS and showed his true colors. Hariyoto was seen as the President's man, but as it turned out, he resisted Soeharto's attempt to impose Harmoko as Golkar chairman. Given his Christianity and his long-time dominance in military intelligence, it is not surprising, then, that Christian generals and intelligence officers have become major targets for a continuing purge.

The liquidation of BAIS and its replacement by a less-powerful military intelligence agency, BIA, can be understood in this light. Established in August 1983, four months after Benny Murdani became Armed Forces' Commander, it combined two military intelligence apparatuses Benny had previously headed—Pusat Intelijen Strategis (Pusintelstat, Armed

Forces Strategic Intelligence Center) and Kopkamtib's intelligence service—and was headed by the Armed Forces Commander (i.e., Benny himself from 1983 to 1988) with the assistant for intelligence as his deputy. It constituted the inner core of the military leadership under Benny, eclipsed Bakin, the National Intelligence Coordinating Agency, and it remained his power base long after he was elevated to the post of Minister of Defense in March 1988.

The liquidation of BAIS was therefore clearly meant to dismantle his last institutional stronghold in the military. The new agency, BIA, is also institutionally less powerful, headed by an assistant for intelligence who reports to the Armed Forces' Chief of the General Staff and no longer directly to the Armed Forces' Commander. It has reportedly fewer powers and less staff. But it is too early to draw any conclusion as regards whether its "mission" is now narrowly defined in terms of military intelligence. Whether its function stays with BIA or shifts to BAKIN or any new body, Soeharto still needs an intelligence apparatus to keep his Pancasila democracy in good order. We need to know whether the BIA still has the powers vested in Directorate "A" (internal affairs) of BAIS, which its Director, Brig. Gen. Agum Gumelar used so flagrantly in arranging the election of Megawati as PDI chairperson in December 1993.

For now, however, the main job of BIA seems to be intra-military surveillance. The two officers most responsible for the liquidation of BAIS were Brig. Gen. (now Maj. Gen.) Arie Kumaat and Col. (now Brig. Gen.) Subagyo Hari Siswojo as Director of Directorate "D" (intra-military surveillance) and first assistant to the Director respectively. Little is known about the background of Arie Kumaat's successor, Deputy Head of BIA Brig. Gen. Soeparno Koesyoso, except that he previously served as Director of Directorate"C," BIA. (It is not clear what the responsibility of BIA Directorate "C" is; in the BAIS, it was in charge of "counter-espionage.") But Maj. Gen. Syamsir Siregar, who replaced Maj. Gen. Arie Sudewo as the new Assistant for Intelligence to the Chief of the General Staff and Head of BIA, has little intelligence background except when he served as such in the Kostrad in his early career (1973–1977).

It should also be noted that Arie Kumaat and Subagyo Hari Siswojo have been amply rewarded for their work since then. Having served as Deputy Head of the BIA from January to August 1994, Arie Kumaat was appointed Commander of Kodam 1 (North Sumatra) in August, one of the first two regional commanders that Class 7 (1966) produced. (The other is Maj. Gen. I. Ketut Wirdhana, now Commander of Kodam 8.) Subagyo Hari Siswojo, long-time presidential security guard (Commander of Group "A," Presidential Security Guard from 1989 to 1993), on the other hand, is now Commander of Special Forces (Kopassus) and one of the first two Class 11 (1970) brigadier generals.

If the liquidation of BAIS and the scaling down (at least for now) of military intelligence were welcomed widely by field officers who had long hated the undue prominence of the intelligence apparatus, the "purge" of Christian generals seems to have caused widespread resentment. Shortly after being "promoted" from Commander of Kodam 9 (Lesser Sundas and East Timor) to Commander of the Armed Forces' Staff and Command School, Protestant Maj. Gen. Theo Syafei openly said in an interview with *Editor* that "I don't know whether this position is a promotion or political strategy [strategi politiek]." The one year extension of Menadonese Protestant Lt. Gen. Mantiri's active duty as Armed Forces' Chief of the General Staff as well as the promotion of Menadonese Protestants Brig. Gen. Arie Kumaat and Col. Johny Lumintang to Commander of Kodam 1 (North Sumatra) and

Commander of the Kostrad First Infantry Division are partly attempts to placate the uneasiness among Christian officers.

Another factor that seems relevant to understanding the volatility of the situation is structural. As we noted in *Indonesia* 56, the unusually large Class 6 (1965) held back Class 7 and possibly Class 8 from reaching command positions in Korem in the late 1980s and early 1990s. Now dominant in the army central and regional commands, Class 6 officers again threaten to hold back Class 7, 8, and 9 from reaching staff and command positions in the army central and regional commands. In this light it is interesting to see the current class distribution of regional command posts. In the recent reshuffle, Class 4 relinquished one (Kuntara, Commander of Kostrad); Class 6 lost two (Kodam 1 went from Pranowo to Arie Kumaat, Class 7; Kodam 2 was passed from Syamsir Siregar to his classmate, Yunus Yosfiah; Kodam 8 went from Tarub to Wirdhana, Class 7, but Tarub was appointed Kostrad Commander; Kodam 9 went from Theo Syafei to Adang Ruchiatna, Class 8); Class 7 gained two (Arie Kumaat and Wirdhana became commanders of Kodam 1 and 2); and Class 8 gained one (Adang Ruchiatna got Kodam 9). The most prominent loser was Brig. Gen. Agum Gumelar, former Commander of Special Forces (Kopassus), who was "promoted" to Chief of Staff, Kodam 1, under Arie Kumaat, even though he had been promoted earlier to the post of Director of BAIS Directorate "A," a post more important than Arie Kumaat's as head of BAIS Directorate "D."

This Class distribution of Kodam commanders makes us wonder what Armed Forces' Commander Gen. Feisal Tanjung meant when he justified the recent reshuffle in terms of "regenerasi," for the waves of personnel changes have not brought about any meaningful "regenerasi" so far. Three interpretations are possible for "regenerasi." One is hastening the departure of the Benny-"contaminated" officers, above all those who were 40 to 45 years old when Murdani came to power in 1983 and 45 to 50 years old when he ended his tenure as the Armed Forces' Commander in 1988, because those are key years in an army officer's career as to whether he will stay as permanent colonel or be promoted to a general. The great majority of officers in the present listing are in this category, but notable exceptions are Brig. Gen. Wiranto (Class 9 and former presidential adjutant) and Brig. Gen. Subagyo Hari Siswanto and Brig. Gen. Johnny Lumintang (Class 11). The second interpretation is to see who will be on active duty in 1998, and ready for staff and command positions at the Armed Forces headquarters and the army and central and regional commands. These should be officers born between 1944 and 1948, which means more or less Class 7–11.

And finally the third interpretation is related to officers' connections with East Timor. There are not very many who we can say for sure have served in East Timor: Mantiri (Protestant, Class 3), Theo Syafei (Protestant, Class 6), Mochamad Ma'ruf (Class 6), Yunus Yosfiah (Class 6), Yacob Dasto (Class 6), Wirdhana (Class 7), Adang Ruchiatna (Class 8), and Johnny Lumintang (Protestant, Class 11). To put it in another way, there are only three post-Class 6 generals with East Timor connections in our listing, which makes us wonder whether Feisal Tanjung's "regenerasi" and the purge of Christian generals might also have something to do with Soeharto's plan to change course on East Timor and hence to get hardliners on the issue out of the way.

If our interpretation is anywhere near the mark, it is reasonable to expect more waves of reshuffles to come in the near future, for there are many waiting in the wings before we can see a real "regenerasi." To mention but a few: Maj. Gen. Ilyas Yusuf (former Commander of Kostrad First Infantry Division and now Commander, Army Center for the Development of

Operations Systems), Brig. Gen. Karyono (Chief of Staff, Kostrad), and Brig. Gen. Arifin Tarigan (Commander, Army Infantry Weapons Center), all Class 6; Brig. Gen. Yusuf Kartanegara (Chief of Staff, Capital Garrison), Brig. Gen. Suwarno Adiwijoyo (Chief of Staff, Kodam 3), Brig. Gen. H. A. Rivai (Commander, Kostrad Second Infantry Division), and Brig. Gen. Sridono (Chief of Staff, Kodam 8), Class 7.

Finally, Army Chief-of-Staff Wismoyo Arismunandar seems all but finished as an important player in military politics because of his extra-marital affairs which Mrs. Soeharto detests. With the recent reshuffle, two of his most important classmates, Maj. Gen. Arie Sudewo and Maj. Gen. Kuntara, were relieved of their posts as Assistant for Intelligence to the Armed Forces' Chief of the General Staff and Kostrad Commander respectively. With his mandatory retirement due in February 1995, he may well be looking forward to a quiet life in an obscure place somewhere abroad.
