A Gold Medal has been awarded for the overall display, and separate First Class certificates have been given to the Alden and the Naples grapes, both of which were introduced this year. The awards will join the voluminous collection in the Jordan Hall Museum.

Amalgamation of the two societies into a proposed "American Entomological Society" is an important item on the agenda. Doctor Chapman, now Chairman of the Eastern Branch of the present Association of Economic Entomologists, is a Vice President of the national Association and will continue in that capacity in the newly formed society.
