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# CORNELL UNIVERSITY WOMEN'S RESIDENTIAL HALLS

#### GENERAL SUPERVISION

THE general supervision of the women students of Cornell University, whether they live in the residential halls or elsewhere, is entrusted to the Counselor of Women. All undergraduate students except those who live in their own homes are required by the University's rules to live in the residential halls or cottages. Permission to live elsewhere in Ithaca is granted to an undergraduate student only upon written application to the Counselor of Women, and then only in very exceptional circumstances.

Graduate students and special students of mature years can obtain rooms in University houses reserved for their exclusive use. The Counselor of Women may permit a graduate student or a special student to live in a house not under the Counselor's direct supervision

if the conditions are found to be satisfactory.

The University wishes to assist all students, including those who do not find accommodation in its own halls or houses, to obtain satisfactory rooms. But the University can not assume any responsibility for the selection of a room in any outside house, not even in a house that is on its approved list.

#### THE UNIVERSITY'S HALLS AND HOUSES

The residential halls and University houses which are to be described in this booklet are:

The Residential Halls: Balch Halls, Anna Comstock House, and

Prudence Risley Hall.

The University Houses: I The Circle, 2 The Circle, 3 The Circle, 4 The Circle, 5 East Avenue, 9 East Avenue, 15 East Avenue, 207–11 Fall Creek Drive, 225 Fall Creek Drive, 3 Grove Place, 5 Grove Place, 5 Reservoir Avenue, Risley Cottage at 613 Thurston Avenue, 2 South Avenue, 9 South Avenue, 706 Stewart Avenue, 722 University Avenue, 302 Wait Avenue, and 308 Wait Avenue.

2 South Avenue is reserved for graduate women only.

The Balch Halls for Women, accommodating three hundred and eighteen students, were opened in the autumn of 1929. The University owes its possession of them to the generous interest of two Cornellians, Allen C. Balch and his wife, Janet Jacks Balch, of Los Angeles. The halls are situated north of Fall Creek Gorge, near Prudence Risley Hall. They are built of native stone in the English

Collegiate Gothic style, and are thoroughly fireproof and of modern construction and appointment. They are in four units, each unit under the charge of a warden and each having its separate reception hall, living room, and dining room. In addition to ample bathrooms in all corridors, each room or pair of rooms has a hand lavatory with running water. In some cases the lavatory serves two rooms which communicate with it on either side but which are otherwise separate from each other.

Anna Comstock House consists of two units, Section A housing thirty-seven students and Section B housing forty-one students. On the first floor of each unit there are reception rooms and suites for the chaperons. In both sections the accommodations for students, with few exceptions, consist of units for three or four students. Each unit consists of two bedrooms, a study, and a bath. In Section A there is one single room and one double room. In Section B there are five single rooms. Students living in this house take their meals in the nearest dormitory dining room and are under the same rules and regulations as the residents of the main dormitories.

Prudence Risley Hall, the gift of the late Mrs. Russell Sage to the University, was opened in the autumn of 1913. It accommodates one hundred and ninety students. It is a fireproof building, beautifully situated on the north bank of Fall Creek Gorge, within easy reach of the main University buildings. Almost every one of the rooms is designed for a single occupant, and the building was so planned that every room in which a student lives receives sunlight at some time in the day. An electric elevator runs to the upper floors. On the first floor are three large drawing rooms, a large recreation room, and dining rooms. The students living in the building are under the immediate charge of the Warden of Prudence Risley Hall.

Following are the University houses and cottages connected with the Residential Halls. The residents of these houses take their meals in the nearest dormitory dining room and are under the same rules and regulations as the residents of the main dormitories.

- 1 The Circle accommodates twenty-two students and a chaperon. The first floor consists of a large living room, a suite for the chaperon, four student rooms, and a bath. On the second floor there are five student rooms and one large bath. On the third floor there are three rooms for students. There is running water on this floor, but students go to the second floor for bathroom accommodations.
- **2** The Circle accommodates seventeen students and a chaperon. On the first floor there is a reception room, reception hall, accommodations for the chaperon, two student rooms, and a bath. On the second floor there are six student rooms and a bath. There is one double room and bath on the third floor.
- 3 The Circle accommodates sixteen students and a chaperon. The first floor consists of a reception room, suite for the chaperon, three

student rooms, and a bath. On the second floor there are six rooms accommodating students, and two baths.

- 4 The Circle accommodates eighteen students and a chaperon. On the first floor there is a reception room, accommodations for the chaperon, four student rooms, and a bath. There are seven student rooms and a large bath on the second floor.
- **5 East Avenue** accommodates eighteen students. On the first floor there are two reception rooms, a suite for the chaperon, and a suite with bath accommodating three students. On the second floor there are study bedrooms for students and two bathrooms. On the third floor there are two single rooms and a suite consisting of a large study and a bedroom accommodating three students.
- **9 East Avenue** accommodates fifteen students and a chaperon. On the first floor there is a large reception room, accommodations for the chaperon, two double rooms, and a bath. On the second floor there are four double rooms and two baths. On the third floor there are three single rooms and one bath.
- 15 East Avenue accommodates twenty students. The house contains four bathrooms—one on the first floor, two on the second, and one on the third. There is a reception room on the first floor and a suite for the chaperon.
- 207–11 Fall Creek Drive is situated just across the Fall Creek Gorge on the north side of the campus. There are accommodations for thirty-five students and a chaperon. On the first floor there is a large reception room, chaperon's suite, seven rooms for students, and two baths. The second floor consists of twelve rooms for students and two baths. There are eight single rooms and two baths on the third floor.
- 225 Fall Creek Drive is adjacent to 207-11 Fall Creek Drive. It houses twelve students and a chaperon. The first floor consists of a reception room, suite for the chaperon, two student rooms, and a bath. On the second floor there are four student rooms and a bath. On the third floor there are two student rooms and a bath.
- 3 Grove Place is situated at the south end of the main campus. the house accommodates fourteen students and a chaperon. There is a large living room on the first floor, a chaperon's suite, accommodations for four students, and a bath. The second floor accommodates ten students, and there is a bath on this floor.
- **5** Grove Place accommodates fifteen students and a chaperon. On the first floor there is a reception room, a chaperon's suite, and rooms for five students. There are two baths on this floor available for the students. The second floor consists of accommodations for ten students, and there are two baths on this floor.
- 5 Reservoir Avenue accommodates eighteen students and a chaperon. On the ground floor there are two student rooms and a bath. On the first floor there are two reception rooms, a suite for the

chaperon, three student rooms, and a bath. On the second floor there are five student rooms and a bath. There are two student rooms and a bath on the third floor.

Risley Cottage, situated within the grounds of Risley Hall, at 613 Thurston Avenue, accommodates ten students. There is a bathroom on each floor and a reception room on the first floor.

- **9 South Avenue** is situated on the south side of the campus. This house accommodates seventeen students. On the first floor there are living rooms and a suite for the chaperon, accommodations for four students, and a bath. On the second floor there are accommodations for nine students with two baths. On the third floor there are accommodations for four students with a bath.
- 706 Stewart Avenue accommodates twenty-two students and a chaperon. This house is situated directly across from the northwest side of the campus and was leased by the University a year ago to provide enough room for women students. On the first floor there is a living room and accommodations for four students. On the second floor there is a suite for the chaperon, and accommodations for ten students. There are two bathrooms on this floor. The third floor consists of accommodations for eight students and a bathroom.
- 722 University Avenue is situated in the northwest section of the campus and accommodates seventeen students and a chaperon. The first floor consists of a suite for the chaperon and accommodations for four students, also a bath for the use of these four students. On the second floor there are accommodations for nine students and two bathrooms. There are accommodations for four students on the third floor. There is a bath on the third floor.
- 302 Wait Avenue accommodates fifteen students and a chaperon. On the first floor there is a reception room, chaperon's suite, three rooms, and a bath. On the second floor there are six student rooms and two baths. There are three student rooms and a bath on the third floor.
- 308 Wait Avenue is situated within two minutes' walk of Risley Hall and accommodates seventeen students. There is a bathroom on each floor. Students living in this house have the use of two reception rooms on the first floor. There is a suite for the chaperon on the first floor.

#### FOR GRADUATE WOMEN

2 South Avenue is located at the south end of the campus and accommodates nine students and a chaperon. It is reserved for graduate students only. There are two bathrooms, one on the first floor and one on the second floor. There is a reception room on the first floor. Residents are subject to the rules and regulations that govern the residents of the main dormitories. The charge at 2 South Avenue is \$254 for the college year from September to May for room and allowance of personal laundry. Graduate women living

in this house are free to take their meals outside the University dormitories.

#### FURNISHINGS OF THE ROOMS

All the buildings have steam heat and electric lighting. Every room is completely furnished. Three woolen blankets are supplied to each student. Students who wish additional covering should supply it themselves. Each student furnishes her own towels and soap and makes her own bed. All other service and supplies are included in the charge for residence. The student is advised to

bring with her an extra comfortable or blanket.

Telephone service is available in every house. There is no charge to students for incoming calls. A charge of five cents a message is made for outgoing local calls. Each student is responsible for the payment of all calls made from the extension in her room. The regular toll rates are charged for all long distance calls made through the dormitory switchboard. The dormitory switchboard serves all of the dormitories and cottages for both men and women with the exception of 601 Stewart Avenue and 516 University Avenue. In the houses on The Circle, Fall Creek Drive, and the houses at 5 Grove Place, 9 East Avenue, 706 Stewart Avenue, and 722 University Avenue, telephone service may not be available in each room at the beginning of the year. It has not been possible under the present Government regulations to obtain individual phones. Semi-public telephones will be available in these houses, however.

Radio equipment may be installed only by the University's Department of Buildings and Grounds, at the tenant's expense, and only with the written consent of the Manager of Residential Halls.

#### APPLICATION FOR ROOMS

Applications for rooms are received only at the office of the Man-

ager of Residential Halls, Morrill Hall, Ithaca, N. Y.

An application for a room, if made by or on behalf of a candidate for admission to one of the colleges of the University, will be entertained only after that candidate has deposited with the Treasurer of the University the \$25 which the University requires all such candidates to deposit. Rooms are assigned in order of application.

An application for a room, if made by a graduate student, must be accompanied by a deposit of \$10, and the application will not be registered unless the deposit accompanies it. If the lease is executed and the student occupies the room, the deposit is held until the end of the year to insure the completion of the lease and the return of keys and to cover any damage beyond ordinary wear and tear. If the application is withdrawn before August 15 for any good and sufficient reason beyond the student's control, the deposit will be refunded.

#### ASSIGNMENT OF ROOMS

Rooms are assigned strictly in the order of application. No double room can be held by one person, even though she may be willing to

pay the full price. The University reserves all rights in connection with the assignment or reassignment of rooms or the termination of their occupancy. New students are notified of their assignments about August 20, and at that time they should execute and return their contract cards at once.

#### CHARGES

A single charge of \$550 is made for residence for the academic year, that is, from the day before registration in September until the day after the student's last examination in May. This charge covers the items of room, board, and the allowance of personal laundry. Owing to the unsettled condition of prices for food and labor, the University reserves the right to increase this charge during the year if the Trustees believe such an increase to be necessary.

#### PAYMENTS

Payment of the charge for residence is made in four equal installments. The first of these is due and payable by September 1. A failure to pay the first quarterly installment by September 1 will be regarded as a surrender of the lease. The second installment is due on November 20 and must be paid not later than November 30. The third installment is due on registration day of the second term and must be paid not later than February 10. The fourth installment is due on March 20 and must be paid not later than March 30.

## ADJUSTMENTS

The charge for residence covers the period beginning on the day before the first registration day of the first term and ending on the last day of work of the second term, and it does not include the Christmas Recess. Students who arrive before the day next preceding the first registration day or who remain during the Christmas Recess will be charged extra at the rate of \$1 per day for room.

Entering students who must come to Ithaca for examinations before registration day may arrange for rooms in the dormitories at the

charge of \$1 per day.

No deduction is made for an absence of ten days or less. For an unavoidable absence of more than ten days an equitable adjustment may be made. Absence from the dining room or failure to send in the full amount of laundry allowed each week does not entitle the student to any deduction. The allowance of laundry is purposely made as generous as possible and it is expected that every student will use the full allowance every week.

#### LAUNDRY

Every piece sent to the laundry should have the owner's name plainly marked on it with Payson's indelible ink or with an embroidered name tab. Marking with a rubber stamp or with the so-called indelible pad is not effective. The laundry allowance is fifteen pieces every week, according to the following scale:

Fifteen pieces are allowed each week. Only two blouses or two skirts, or one blouse and one plain skirt, or one plain dress are included in the weekly allowance. Blouses, skirts, or fancy pieces in excess of lists cannot be substituted for plain articles on list. Outside laundrymen or washerwomen are not allowed to call at the dormitories.

#### DAMAGES

Lamps, shades, or other furnishings broken or missing, and all damage to a room or its fixtures or furniture beyond ordinary wear and tear will be charged to the occupant or occupants of a room. Articles may not be tacked or fastened or pasted with stickers in any way to the walls, furniture, or electric light fixtures. Pictures and other ornaments may be suspended only from the picture molding. A printed card containing an inventory of the articles in the room is presented to the student at the beginning of the year for verification and signature, and after that the occupant is held responsible for any damage or loss of those articles.

## GOVERNMENT OF THE STUDENT WOMEN

Under the Statutes of the University, the Counselor of Women has the general charge of the interests of women students and advises them in regard to all matters, subject to the statutes and rules and regulations of the Board of Trustees and of the general and special faculties. She is recognized as the representative of the University in all matters related to the conduct, the social life, and the self-government organization of the women students.

Wardens, under the direction of the Counselor of Women, are in charge of the several halls and houses of residence. Each Warden is the adviser of the students under her care and is responsible for the conduct and the social life of the hall or house which she supervises.

The students are allowed as large a measure of self-direction as possible through their organization, the Women's Self-Government

Association. Every woman who registers as a student in the University becomes *ipso facto* a member of this association. The Self-Government Association, through its Judiciary Committees, tries any charge of misconduct. If the charge is sustained, the Association either imposes and enforces a penalty or, if the offense is so serious as to call for university action and be made a matter of university record, reports its findings and its recommendations to the general disciplinary committee of the University, the Committee on Student Conduct.

Every student, upon assignment to a room in the residential halls or houses, signs a contract agreeing to abide by the rules established by the University and by the Association. Any student who willfully and persistently disregards any of these rules renders herself liable to dismissal from the University.

#### THE HEALTH OF STUDENTS

The University has a Medical Adviser of Women, who is a doctor of medicine. Every entering student receives a physical examination, and every student is recommended to make free use of the privilege of consulting the Medical Adviser, who keeps regular daily office hours for that purpose. The University Infirmary has a normal capacity of seventy-five beds and the number can be doubled in an emergency.

The gymnasium for all the women students of the University is in Sage College. Physical training is required of all students in the first two years. The Medical Adviser prescribes corrective exercises for students whose health requires them. All the gymnasium and athletic work is carried on under the direction of the Department of Physical Training.
