


NURSERY NOTES

VEGETABLE GROWERS NEXT WEEK

While we have not yet seen the official program for the annual meeting of the State Vegetable Growers Association to be held in the Seneca Hotel in Rochester Thursday and Friday of next week, we understand that the Director is to speak at the banquet on Thursday evening and that other members of the staff will take part in the meetings. The Station will also join with the College of Agriculture in an educational exhibit, including units from the Divisions of Entomology and Plant Pathology and a publications display.



THE FRUIT GROWERS! MEETING

Those who participate in the exhibit at the meeting of the State Horticultural Society in Rochester the week of January 9 are requested to dust off their displays and clean up their signs in preparation for this event. At the present time the list of Station exhibits includes a joint display by Chemistry and Bacteriology of fruit products, particularly fruit juices; plant propagation and peach thinning by Dr. Tukey, Mr. Brase, and Mr. Einset; apple varieties by the Pomology Division; a publication exhibit; a colchicine display; the usual exhibits from Entomology and Plant Pathology; an exhibit from the Seed Laboratory; and a small exhibit by Dr. Hofer on legume inoculants. Exhibits are to be in place by Monday night, January 9, the meetings opening on Tuesday norning, the 10th.
