## FORMER PROFESSOR OF CHEMISTRY DIES

Dr. Alfred William Avens, Professor of Chemistry, Emeritus, died at his home in Santa Maria, California October 4, 1976.

Dr. Avens began his career at Cornell University in 1926 as an Assistant in Chemistry. He came to Geneva in 1935 as an Assistant in Research in the Division of Chemistry. He eventually reached the rank of Professor of Chemistry in the Department of Food Science and Technology.

While at Geneva, Dr. Avens was in charge of the Analytical Section of Food Science and Technology. Work in this section included the laboratory analyses of official samples of insecticides and fungicides and of feeds and fertilizers for the State of New York. His personal research projects were in the field of insecticides and fungicides involving chemical and physical properties, phytocidal action of fungicides and insecticides, and spray residue problems.

Dr. Avens received his B.S. degree in chemistry from Colgate University in 1923, his M.S. in chemistry from Colgate in 1926, and his Ph.D. degree in analytical and physical chemistry from Cornell University in 1935.

He retired from the Station June 30, 1967. At the time of his retirement, he lived on Slosson Lane, later moving to California.

## **THE CHATTER BOX**

Chand Watve, Entomology, traveled to several places during the period of October 20-29 in connection with the IR-4 Project. He went to State College, Pennsylvania; Morgantown, West Virginia; Beltsville, Maryland; and Newark, Delaware. Chand presented seminars at the University of Maryland, University of Delaware, and the USDA Laboratory at Beltsville.

On Sunday, October 24, the first New York City Fiveborough Marathon was run—from the toll plaza of the Verrazano Narrows Bridge on Staten Island, up through Brooklyn to the Queensboro Bridge, along the East River in Manhattan, and briefly over in the Bronx and back, then down the length of Central Park to finish at the Tavern-on-the-Green. Bob LaBelle, Food Science, was there, enjoying unaccustomed and changing vistas of the Manhattan skyline while running in the middle of the pack of 2,000 plus starters along the 26-mile plus course. While failing to see much of Bill Rodgers and Frank Shorter, the U.S.'s two premier marathoners who finished first and second, he estimates his own finish to have been about 700th in just under 3½ hours—respectable, if unexciting. But, it was admittedly a thrill to be part of this big happening, rivaling in many respects the famed Boston marathon.
