



Professor Héctor D. Abruña was born in Santurce, Puerto Rico in 1953. After receiving his BS and MS degrees in 1975 and 1976 at the Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute he went on to the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill for his PhD in analytical chemistry which was awarded in 1980. After postdoctoral work under Professor Allen J. Bard at the University of Texas at Austin, Professor Abruña began his academic career at the University of Puerto Rico as an Assistant Professor in 1982. In 1983 he accepted an assistant professor position at Cornell, and was promoted to associate professor in 1988 and full professor in 1991. In 1994 Professor Abruña was named Emile M. Chamot Professor of Chemistry, and in 2004 began his service as Chair to the department.

Professor Abruña has received several awards including a Presidential Young Investigator Award, an Alfred P. Sloan Research Foundation Fellowship, a John Simon Guggenheim Memorial Foundation Fellowship, the Tajima Prize of the International Society of Electrochemistry, a J. William Fulbright Senior Scholar award and the Iberdrola Fellowship. He is a member of the American Chemical Society, the Electrochemical Society, the Society for Electroanalytical Chemistry, and the Phi Lambda Upsilon Honorary Chemical Society. He is also currently the editor of the *Journal of Electroanalytical Chemistry*.

In his career he has published 256 publications, 1 book, and has 5 patents. In addition he has given over 300 seminars and presentations.

Professor Abruña is an avid runner and a prodigious consumer of espresso.
