Biographical Statement

Jeanne Moseley is a Lecturer in Division of Nutritional Sciences and the Associate Director for the Global Health Program. After completing her undergraduate education, she served for two years as a Peace Corps Volunteer in The Gambia, West Africa. After returning from The Gambia, Jeanne was a public school teacher for two years in a resource-poor community in Atlanta, Georgia. These formative experiences led to Jeanne's strong interest in public health, as well as her passion for working with vulnerable populations both in the United States and abroad. She received her MPH in Global Health from Emory University, where her thesis research explored the needs and worries of a group of HIV positive women in Soweto, South Africa and their patterns and determinants of HIV positive serostatus disclosure. While at Emory, Jeanne was also awarded a one-year graduate fellowship to specifically study the intersections between health, culture and society. Before coming to Cornell, Jeanne worked as a research scientist with the HIV Epidemiology Program of the New York City Department of Health and Mental Hygiene.

In the fall of 2006, Jeanne joined the Division of Nutritional Sciences to support the launch of the new Global Health Program at Cornell and the development of a new undergraduate minor in Global Health open to undergraduate students from across the University. The mission of the Global Health Program is to engage new researchers and practitioners in the field of global health and to establish new and unique research collaborations that will foster a multidisciplinary approach to solving global health problems. To achieve this mission, Jeanne works closely with Division faculty to develop and evaluate global health curriculum and global service learning programs for the undergraduate students at Cornell. Jeanne is the lead instructor for several global health courses that are team-taught, and is responsible for course management and student evaluations. She works closely with faculty in the Division and both faculty and staff of other Cornell colleges to develop global service learning (GSL) & internship programs and to facilitate student placement at international sites. She is responsible for the direction and implementation of Global Health Summer Programs in Tanzania and Zambia and supports the coordination of GSL programs in the Dominican Republic and India. Jeanne also serves as the primary advisor for students enrolled in the Minor in Global Health. Her current areas of interest are global health curriculum development, the pedagogy of global service learning and the critical dimensions of reciprocity in the context of international partnerships and collaborations.
