SHAULIS SCHOLAR HONORED

Danielle M. Bernard, from Fredonia, N.Y., is the 1995 recipient of the Nelson J. Shaulis summer scholarship. She was the honored guest in the Horticultural Sciences Department at the Agricultural Experiment Station on Tuesday, July 25, visiting viticulturists, plant pathologists, and entomologists who are involved in grape research at the Station.

The Nelson J. Shaulis award was established in 1978-79 in honor of then-retiring Nelson Shaulis. The work-experience award funds the work of a viticulture student and allows them to work directly with Cornell grape research and extension faculty on an independent research project. The award is administered by the New York Grape Production Research Fund.

"I was very honored. It is a great opportunity," said Bernard, whose family grew Concord grapes on a contract basis in Fredonia for six years while she was growing up. Bernard had "hands-on" familiarity with trimming vines and other viticultural practices, but her summer research project on the consequences of feeding injury by the banded grape bug, *Tydia scrupaea*, on grape cluster development, is one of the first real research projects with which she has been involved. Bernard majored in biology and graduated with a B.S. from SUNY Fredonia, in May of this year.

Bernard is collaborating with Greg English-Loeb and Tim Martinson, of the New York State Agricultural Experiment Station in Geneva, and Jim Kamas and Rick Dunst at the Vineyard Lab in Fredonia, where she is actively employed.

"Danielle has been able to do work that would not have otherwise been able to be funded because of dwindling research dollars," said John H. Brahm III, of Arbor Hill Winery, in Naples, chairman of the Shaulis Advancement of Viticulture Award Committee.

Danielle's project involves active collaboration between viticulturist Bob Pool and entomologist English-Loeb. "Collaborative projects are really what the industry needs," said English-Loeb. "Tim Martinson has been most directly involved, helping her design the experiment and take it into the field."

"Not only has Danielle been involved in an educational experience," said Brahm, "but, in a very short period of time, she will be able to give the industry some very good, useful data."

Banded grape bugs have become more abundant in Concord vineyards in recent years, presumably as a result of reduced insecticide use. It has been hypothesized that early- and mid-season feeding by the immature and adult banded bugs may be partially responsible for poor grape set and cluster development in the Lake Erie growing region. Bernard expects to co-author a paper with English-Loeb and Martinson, upon completion of the project, and hopes to have a first draft by fall.

"I am disappointed not to have been able to meet with Nelson Shaulis himself," said Bernard, who knows the renowned viticulturist by reputation only. She was scheduled to meet with the emeritus professor, but was unable to do so because of Dr. Shaulis' recent hospitalization. 🍇

ESSENTIAL SERVICES

Buildings and Properties has been busy this week keeping essential services at the Station running. Just before 5 p.m. on Tuesday, July 18, a 500 KVA transformer in the Seeds Building faulted. That night, B&P ran a 4/0 cable from General Services to backfeed essential services in the Raw Products building until temporary power could be arranged. NYSEG installed a temporary transformer on Monday, July 24, which will be on-line until Square D is able to supply a new transformer.

"The transformer that failed was smaller than a desk, but weighs 2,650 pounds," said staff engineer John VanderWeide. "The new one being shipped weighs 4,600 pounds. It will take 10 weeks or longer to get here."

VanderWeide organized the B&P shutdown of the 140-foot smoke stack, starting Sunday morning, July 23. The shutdown affected the absorption machine in Barton (and hence, the air conditioning), distilled water supply, and autoclaves.

"Part of the Design Phase for the new boilers in the heating plant requires that it be inspected," said VanderWeide. "While we had it shut down, we cleaned out 3 feet of soot in the bottom of the tower with a tank-truck vacuum cleaner." The stack is cleaned every 6 or 7 years.

Colonie Construction, who was the contractor, tied ladders which came in 9-foot sections to the lightning rod in order to inspect the stack (*see photo*). The boiler was fired back up Tuesday afternoon.

B&P would like to thank all Station employees for their cooperation during both service interruptions.



MACFACTS

VIEW THE ENTIRE PASTEBOARD • In PageMaker, to get a reduced view of your screen, including the entire pasteboard, press and hold the **Shift** key as you select **Fit in Window** from the **Page** menu.

CACHE IN ON ITS MEMORY • If your Mac appears to run out of memory quickly, you may want to check its memory settings. From the **Control Panels** folder (in your **System Folder**), double click on **Memory**. You can change the size of the disk cache and turn on virtual memory and 32-bit addressing. You'll probably have to experiment with the settings to achieve the proper balance for your system. Remember: Don't change the settings just because you can. Consult your Apple manual to learn more about which memory settings are right for your machine.

SORT TEXT • When using Word, you can sort text alphabetically or in reverse-alphabetical order. Simply select the text entries you want to sort, and from the **Tools** menu, select **Sort**. To sort in Z to A order, press and hold the **Shift** key as you select **Sort** from the **Tools** menu.
