### RECYCLING BOND PAPER NOW MANDATORY

It became State law on July 1, 1990 that recycling of bond paper is mandatory for all State-funded agencies. This includes the Geneva Station.

Consequently, this past week, all offices and laboratories received receptacles for holding this paper. All paper can be put into these baskets **except**: magazines and books, paper wrappings, window envelopes, food wrappers, carbon paper, blueprints, soiled paper, paper cups, tissues, and paper towels.

If your office or laboratory does not have one of these new receptacles, please contact either Buildings and Properties at x301 or your building custodian.

Incidentally, it is also a State law that recycled paper be used whenever possible. A primary place where recycled paper can be used is in copying machines. Recycled paper can be obtained through Cornell University.

### HUGH PRICE NEW HORTICULTURAL SCIENCES CHAIR

Hugh C. Price took over as Chairperson of the Station's Department of Horticultural Sciences on July 1. He succeeds Bob Andersen who has assumed responsibility for the Station's stone fruit breeding program.

Hugh is a native of Newark, Ohio and was raised on a 300-acre fruit farm. He was awarded his bachelor's degree in horticulture from Ohio State University in 1961, his master's degree from the University of Delaware in 1966, and his doctorate degree, also in horticulture (herbicide physiology), from Michigan State University in 1969.

He comes to the Station from Michigan State University where he had been a professor of horticulture from 1971 until now. During his 19 years at Michigan State, he worked with every major vegetable crop grown in that state. He was the former superintendent of the Sodus Horticultural Research Station in southwestern Michigan. He played a major role in establishing and staffing the Southwest Michigan Research and Extension Center at Benton Harbor. He also served as an educational advisor for the Michigan Vegetable Council and worked with the Michigan Food Processors Association.

Before joining the faculty at Michigan State, Hugh was an infantry officer in the United States Marine Corp from 1961-1964 and a research biologist with the American Cyanamid Company from 1969-1971.

## TERENCE ROBINSON AND TIM DENNEHY PROMOTED

Terence Robinson, Horticultural Sciences, and Tim Dennehy, Entomology, have been promoted to the rank of associate professor effective July 1.

Terence is responsible for research and extension on cultural aspects of tree fruits. His research involves studies on trickle irrigation, tree spacing, canopy design, and tree trellising, including a highly acclaimed Y-trellis that promotes efficient use of sunlight for promoting fruit growth and quality.

With a 60 per cent research assignment and 40 per cent extension, Terence is actively involved in communicating research results to growers. He participates in numerous meetings during the year, including tree fruit field days, summer grower tours, and helps organize various fruit schools. Additionally, he has several research-demonstration trials, especially different kinds of orchard design, on growers' farms in New York state.

Terence came to the Station in 1984. He was awarded his bachelor's degree from Brigham Young University in 1978 and his master's and doctorate degrees from Washington State University in 1982 and 1984 respectively. He is a member of the Phi Kappa Phi National Honor Society and the American Society for Horticultural Science.

Tim Dennehy's assignment is 80 per cent research and 20 per cent extension. His research includes studying insects that attack vineyards in New York, and he is helping to develop integrated approaches to their control. He is also working with other scientists at the Station on managing pesticide resistance. This research cuts across commodity lines.

His extension responsibilities include conducting training schools, working closely with fruit agents, conducting surveys of insects attacking grape, and serving as liaison between grape growers and researchers, as well as providing leadership to implement integrated pest management practices with grapes.

Tim obtained his bachelors and doctorate degrees in entomology from the University of California, Davis, in 1980 and 1983. He came to the Station as an assistant professor in 1984. He is a member of the Entomological Society of America, the American Registry of Professional Entomologists, and Sigma Xi.

## CORNELL GRADUATE STUDENTS WIN AWARDS

Zongming Cheng, Donald Cox, and Erik Olsen, three graduate students doing research at Geneva, recently won student awards presented by the Eastern Section of the American Society for Enology and Viticulture. The awards were made at the Society's meeting held in Rochester, New York July 11-13.



Zongming Cheng is doing his work under the leadership of Bruce Reisch, Horticultural Sciences. Zongming won a \$500 award for the best paper on a viticultural topic. His research emphasizes genetic engineering of grapevines for crown gall resistance.

Donald Cox is in Food Science and Technology and is working with Thomas Henick-Kling. He won \$500 for the best paper in the enology area.

Erik Olsen, also a student of Thomas', and Donald Cox each won a \$1,000 scholarship for best student of enology and viticulture. The scholarship is based on past performance, published papers, scholastic standing, research planning, and future direction. Erik's research is attempting to understand how malate transported in bacteria is important to malolactic fermentation during wine making. Don is working on the bioenergetics of malolactic fermentation.
