NELSON SHAULIS VITICULTURE SYMPOSIUM HELD

On Tuesday and Wednesday, March 5 and 6, the first Nelson J. Shaulis Viticulture Symposium will be held in the Jordan Hall Auditorium.

Topic of this symposium is, "Integrated Pest Management of Grape Diseases: Present and Future Strategies." Chairman of the symposium is Martin Goffinet, Horticultural Sciences.

Some 75-100 individuals from the grape and wine industry of New York are expected to attend this first of what the planning committee hopes will be a continuing series of symposia honoring Nelson Shaulis. Nelson is professor emeritus of viticulture in Horticultural Sciences, and is recognized throughout the world for his outstanding contributions to the grape and wine industry made during his long and successful career at Geneva.

In addition to local presenters, there are several invited speakers from outside Cornell University or New York's grape industry. These invited speakers are: W. Douglas Gubler, University of California, Davis; Maria Lodovica Gullino, University, of Torino, Italy; and Michael Ellis, Ohio Agricultural Research and Development Center, Wooster, Ohio. Dennis Rapp, Deputy Commissioner, New York State Department of Agriculture and Markets, will make a keynote address at a banquet on March 5 to be held in the Scandling Center on the campus of Hobart and William Smith Colleges. His topic is, "Albany perspectives on the IPM program."

Other speakers during the two-day symposium are: James E. Hunter, Director, Geneva; Tom Davenport, National Grape Cooperative; Jim Tette, Director, Cornell IPM program; Roger Pearson, Dennis Gonsalves, Tom Burr, Wolfram Koeller, Bob Seem, and Dave Gadoury, Plant Pathology, Geneva; Bob Pool and Bruce Reisch, Horticultural Sciences, Geneva; Guy Jones, a grower from the Hudson Valley; and Timothy Weigle, Cornell IPM grape specialist,

SHARING RIDES TO ITHACA

NEWS FROM THE MAILROOM

As of February 18, UPS is charging a higher price for packages being sent to residential addresses. They are requiring us to indicate on our daily log sheet whether the addresses to which packages are being shipped to are business or residential. Departments sending UPS packages must now indicate this by writing "RESIDENTIAL" or "BUSINESS" next to "UPS" in marker on the package. If there is no indication by department, and the address looks like a residential type, the department will be charged that higher price.
