EXTENSIONS specialists in disease and insect pests of fruit and spray service specialists in the State will meet at the Station next Friday for a conference on recent developments in spraying and dusting.

The Ontario County Calf Club, including boys and girls, will meet at the Station tomorrow to inspect the herd.

THE NEW YORK State Cannery Association has called its regular spring meeting for June 14 at the Station, and has issued an invitation to county agents, canning crops growers, and others interested in canning crops production to participate. The meeting will start off with a lunch in Jordan Hall and the remainder of the time will be devoted to the inspection of work under way at the Canning crops farm.
