THE CANNERS' "SCHOOL"

The annual "School" for canning crops growers and canning factory field men will begin next Tuesday and continue thru Wednesday, with an exceedingly full program for the "students". Specialists from the College of Agriculture, the canning industry, and the Station will act as "teachers" and will give the visiting growers the latest information on the production and marketing of canning crops. In the absence of Mr. Parrott from Geneva, Dr. Hedrick will act as official greeter and will get the two-day school under way with a few opening remarks Tuesday morning. Other members of Staff participating in the school include Mr. Sayre, Dr. Horsfall, Dr. Glasgow, Dr. Hofer, and Mr. Munn. The College and the Station will also present a joint publications exhibit of their newer bulletins and circulars on canning crop and vegetable subjects. The usual banquet will be held at the Seneca Hotel Tuesday evening.

COUNTYWIDE MEETINGS

The entomologists are busy filling engagements at Farm Bureau meetings these days. Dr. Chapman is in the Hudson Valley all of this week and next week. Mr. Parrott and other members of the Entomology Division will spend several days in western New York counties. Mr. Parrott's schedule calls for the opening meeting in Ransomville in Niagara County on March 1 and for meetings every day following, thru Saturday, with the closing session at Sodus.

A HEAVY DATE

In addition to the Ontario County group, which will presumably perfect some sort of County organization, there will be representatives from Wayne, Seneca, and Yates counties, which, with Ontario County, will comprise one of the several regions to be set up this year for the purpose of narrowing the final selection of Western New York's Apple Blossom Queen at the final event at LeRoy. Early indications are that the regional event will be held here at the Station.
