THE ANNUAL INSPECTION

The annual inspection of the work of the Station, particularly with reference to the utilization of federal funds allocated to the Station out of the Hatch, Adams, Purnell, and Bankhead-Jones moneys coming to New York State, is in progress with Dr. H. P. Barss and Dr. F. D. Fromme of the Office of Experiment Stations making the inspection. Dr. Barss has been here before, but Dr. Fromme has only recently joined the Office of Experiment Stations staff, having been for several years Dean and Director of the West Virginia College of Agriculture and Experiment Station and Director of Extension in West Virginia.

THE GARDEN CLUB
