




EUROPE TO BE FULL OF STATION PEOPLE THIS SUMMER

MOLD SCHOOL

Quality Control technicians from tomato processing plants around the State have registered Monday for a training course to be held in the Conference Room in the New Food Science Building. On the faculty will be Dr. Troy of the Continental Can Company in Chicago, Miss Lucy Witherow and Mr. Leo Sharp of the National Canners Association in Washington, D. C. and Mr. Hack of the American Can Company. The project is known generally as the "Mold School" and has to do with the use of the microscope in determining quality standards in tomato products.

SCIENTISTS REPORT

Writing in "Frontiers," Director James G. Horsfall gives a scientist's view of the scientific method, a way of thinking often misunderstood even by many who have great faith in this approach to learning.

"Science," he says, "is not something apart from the regular affairs of life, and the scientist is not a white-coated savant who conjures up miracles" as a magician pulls rabbits from a hat. Science can help provide food for the new millions among us every year, he points out, but this will be done by keen observation, applied curiosity, and the day-to-day output of those who make a regular business of discovery --- not by magic.
