

STATE FAIR

Well, it's State Fair time again -- for those of us who have been involved in planning the Station exhibit, it's been State Fair time for several months -- and today a Station crew left for the fair grounds to begin setting up the Station exhibit. Station entomologists will have an exhibit depicting Biological Control of Insect Pests - a promising new approach in the war with insect pests. Pomologists will feature new and recommended varieties of fruits. Apples, pears, and plums will be displayed in a fruit rack and small fruits will be frozen and exhibited in two freezing cabinets. The remainder of our exhibit space will be devoted to a display of current publications from Geneva and Ithaca.

The Editor's office and the Visual Aids office will be "out of action" at the Station and "in action" at the Fair until September 12. HISTORICAL NOTES

Mr. D. C. Jackson, Jr., of Havre de Grace, Maryland, has sent two newspapers of historical interest and value to the Station. One of these is a copy of the Supplement to the Geneva Courier, dated September 28, 1898, covering extensively the "dedicatory exercises" of Sturtevant Hall, which was dedicated on September 21, 1898, with "prominent speakers and strong addresses the order throughout the day". The other paper is a copy of the New York Farmer, dated July 30, 1896, featuring work done at the time at the Geneva Experiment Station, "a powerful factor in agricultural progress in New York State". Both papers contain several excellent photos of the Station buildings and personnel of the times and articles of great interest to the historically minded.

These two newspapers will be on view in the library for several weeks before being placed in the archives of the Station. We are indebted to Mr. Jackson for his kindness in furnishing us with these two documents.
