

A group of collaborators is meeting with representatives of the United Nations Children's Fund in the Conference Room of the Department of Food Science and Technology on Wednesday and Thursday to discuss research on soybean products. The group includes men from the Northern Regional Laboratory and several commercial organizations in addition to a delegation from Ithaca. Three Brazilian scientists, who are in this country on training grants, are also participating in the meeting and are spending some additional time to observe the techniques used in the pilot plant for the manufacture of soymilk and tempeh.
