B. R. NEBEL DIES

Dr. Bernard R. Nebel, 62, a former member of the Station's Department of Pomology from 1929-1942, died 1 June at Passavent Memorial Hospital in Downers Grove, Illinois. Dr. Nebel was a noted cytologist while a member of the Station's staff.

From 1942 to 1946, Dr. Nebel studied medicine at the University of Rochester and practiced pediatrics in Geneva for about 6 years afterward.

Following his stay in Geneva, Dr. Nebel joined the staff of the Atomic Energy Commission in Washington, D. C., and then went to the Argonne National Laboratory in Lemont, Illinois, as senior cytologist. He has published many papers concerning the fine structure of chromosomes, the effect of irradiation on chromosomes and related topics.

DOLAN IN PULLMAN, WASHINGTON

As a delegate and coordinator for regional project NE-9, Dr. Dolan will present reports and proposals concerning the project.
