Germany has begun a ruthless sea warfare in which she has drawn a barred zone around the Allies through which only one American vessel a week will be allowed to pass. Even hospital ships will be sunken within this area. In spite of the surprise on the part of shipping dealers in this country, we are told that the Allies have known these plans for at least ten days, and the special measures taken to protect Liverpool and Bordeaux are only a part of the Allies' plans that have been promulgated to handle this critical situation. In this critical situation which may bring into the world war, more nations, our President has not issued any statement of his opinion.
