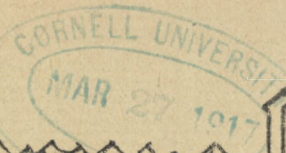

EDITORIAL.

The approval of the advisor of Women upon the recommendations of the Executive Committee concerning the distribution of rooms next year, has been a long step toward solving the immediate dormitory problem.

Without disparagement to the Sophomores, we may truthfully say that the sophomore class of a University is really the least important in the general scheme of things. Not that they lack prestige as individuals, but as a unit their functions are few. They have not the privilege of chaperoning Freshmen - in fact, they have none of the upper-class responsibility upon their shoulders, and yet they have had one year of college life, and it is to be hoped for in the future, of dormitory life. They have learned to take care of themselves in that year, to understand the importance of good conduct, both personally and as it reflects upon the women as a whole.

We are sure that, if the Sophomores cannot reconcile themselves to their fate now, after the trial, they will see the wisdom of the plan, and understand that it is better to be scattered in the outside houses as sophomores rather than as Juniors.
