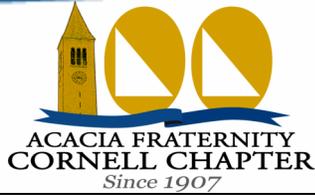

In August 2007, you joined with your fraternity brothers in achieving a major milestone. We celebrated Acacia Fraternity's 100 years on the Cornell Campus. In one way or another, the organizers of that Centennial Reunion reached out to every living brother that could be found. Hundreds of you were found, contacted and encouraged (some might say, hounded) to come to Ithaca. Many came and it was a great celebration, fully enjoyed by everyone who participated.

As we were celebrating 100 years, many of us noticed that our beloved chapter house was showing its age and needed major investments to its infrastructure if it was to continue to support an active chapter and perhaps survive to its bi-centennial. A five year major project to raise \$345,000 for house projects and an endowment began at the Centennial. (You can read more about this campaign elsewhere in the *Traveler*.) With less than two years to go, we are getting very close to victory. We're sure that in the end, the \$345K goal will be achieved because *Acacians always come through*.

Whenever you achieve a goal of this size, you have to celebrate the victory. So, of course, we've started planning the Centennial + 5 reunion. These are the highlights to date.

- Location: Acacia Fraternity and several locations on campus. The committee is researching hotel accommodations and options.



CAUGHT IN THE MOMENT

I was blessed with the opportunity to once again serve as our Alumni Delegate at the 2010 Conclave in New Orleans. It was a great chance for me to meet many of the Actives (and there were many of them; fourteen of our Actives attended!) It was also an opportunity to build and renew relationships with our Brethren from other Acacia chapters.

I would like to report on my experiences as your Alumni delegate. It was my duty to participate in all Conclave business sessions alongside our Venerable Dean and to vote on any matters that were brought before the Conclave. I also attended a series of breakout sessions for Alumni, many of whom were Chapter Advisors and Corporation Board Presidents. Not bound to an agenda, we had very productive discussions about why we are still involved in our Fraternity and how we can help our Chapters help themselves. It was abundantly clear that the Chapters that maintain a healthy relationship with their Alumni are doing quite well.

I have started to develop contacts with Alumni of other Chapters with the goal of locating brothers in the New York Metropolitan area. I would like to make an event open to all local Acacians happen. A longer term goal would be to organize into an Alumni Chapter. An Alumni Chapter can be formed with a mission as simple as hosting a few brotherhood events per year. I do not look for such an organization to replace any kind of informal activities we all share with brothers in our own Chapters, but I feel that an Alumni Chapter could give us a vehicle in which to strengthen Acacia International Fraternity and ultimately our own Chapters.

I don't often wear my emotions on my sleeve but I felt truly caught in the moment at the closing banquet reflecting upon what our Chapter has accomplished in the past decade. Our actives are now bringing in an average of ten brothers a year. We celebrated our Centennial three years ago with over

150 of our Brothers and their families. Many other Chapters have already or are currently following our model for planning their Centennial festivities and Capital campaigns. Our alumni have already come through with over \$250,000 towards our Capital Campaign. The Conclave week alone was surreal. With fourteen of our Actives in attendance, our Chapter took home five awards including Outstanding Chapter. Five of our Brothers were awarded the Order of Pythagoras. Our own Bill Utic, was honored for his two decades of continuous work for the Acacia Fraternity Foundation. Brother Darold Larson, our Executive Director, pulled me aside to commend our success and asked me what is our secret? I cannot think of the words to articulate what I felt when all these thoughts of pride in our Chapter converged in my mind but it took a lot to hold my emotions back. (Of course, a few select beverages in Room 917 and out on Bourbon Street while celebrating with the Brothers helped relieve the intensity of my emotions.

Of course the Actives of the last decade have held the spotlight in bringing the Chapter back to prominence, but I need to say a huge Thank You to all my fellow Alumni who have been the backbone of our success. If you have contributed to and/or participated in our Centennial Campaign in any way, you own a share of the awards that came our way! Obviously, our Acacia Chapter had enough of an impact on your life that you chose to give forward to the next generation of Acacians. After spending four days at Conclave with them, I can tell you they know what to do with the gifts you've given them!

I will always remember the Conclave of 2010 in New Orleans. I am thankful on so many levels that I had this opportunity to reconnect with Acacia at both the Chapter and International level. I am an Acacian. I am proud of it.

CAPITAL CAMPAIGN—AN OPTIMIST’S TAKE

Centennial Capital Campaign Chairman

For the first time in years, it seems, my report on the Centennial Capital Campaign has been pushed out of page one! As the reason for this move is to announce the “Centennial + 5” event, I feel little, if any, concern. Indeed, I am quite excited for the prospect of reuniting brothers far and wide in August 2012, to see the new and improved house, to meet actives current and those yet to be found, and to catch up on the last five years. Much will have happened by then, and much about which we can indeed be proud.

As has been my custom in this column, I will report on the campaign’s progress to date. We have received pledges or gifts from **155** separate donors, totaling **\$259,765** of our total campaign goal of \$345,000. In terms of actual gifts, we have taken in **\$163,120** to the Corporation and **\$72,845** to our chapter’s Acacia Fraternity Foundation account. That leaves us about **\$85,000 short** for the campaign and with **less than two years** to reach it. How will we meet this challenge?


I guess you can call me an optimist. Why? Because I strongly believe that we will meet the challenges of the Centennial Capital Campaign and reach our goal of \$345,000 by 2012. Even though gifts have slowed considerably in the last year, I am hopeful that, with the economy improving once again, our brothers will respond generously as they always have to help us achieve our campaign goals. We are almost there—let’s not stop until we reach the finish line!

And there is really so much more that we want to do to make Acacia shine. In the last few months, the corporation replaced fifty-year-old windows in the dining room with heat-efficient aluminum units. We also replaced decades-old windows in the pantry, basement, and second floor. It is safe to say that EVERY window at Acacia has been replaced since the start of the capital campaign—a clear achievement.

We need to insulate the old part of the house, both to improve the quality of life for the actives in

residence and to save money on heating costs. The parking lot project is an open question among the members of the board and the active chapter. Our current thinking is to wait until we have sufficient reserves to move ahead with the project, but with total costs from excavation, expansion, electrical, and paving nearing \$50,000, this is a large expense item. Finally, we want to install a new conference table with matching chairs in the library for chapter meetings and quiet study. In the process we hope to raise more funds for our chapter’s AFF account to ensure that future generations of Acacians will be supported as they attend the Acacia Leadership Academy (ALA) and Conclaves.

All these projects will happen, over time. The question before us is will we be able to complete them to conclude the capital campaign in 2012? I can envision it now, the chapter’s actives and alumni all gathered together to celebrate the last five (and previous 100) years, and there, as we raise our glasses to Acacia, we will know that through this campaign we have secured her a better future. Looking forward to 2012!
