## FOREIGN STUDENT ENROLLMENT 1965-66

We are pleased to present a summary of the foreign student enrollment at Cornell for the academic year 1965-66. This year we have 1098 foreign students enrolled (an increase of 78 or 7.6% over last year) representing 85 countries. Foreign students now comprise 8.3% of the total student population of the University. The three largest national groups are Canada 195, China 114, and India 112.

Graduate students number 782, an increase of 48 or 6.5% over last year, and make up 71.2% of the foreign student enrollment. They comprise 23.2% of the total number of graduate students enrolled in the University. This includes those students enrolled in the Graduate School and Master's degree candidates in the Graduate School of Business and Public Administration, and the Graduate School of Aerospace Engineering.

The undergraduate foreign student enrollment is 316, an increase of 49 or 17.1% over last year, and represents 3.3% of Cornell's total undergraduate enrollment. The School of Hotel Administration continues to show the highest percentage (11.4%) of foreign students in the undergraduate divisions, again followed by the College of Architecture (5.1%) and the College of Agriculture (4.8%).

For those interested in the enrollment of foreign students across the nation, we quote from the census conducted by the Institute of International Education for the year 1964-65 and summarized in their publication OPEN DOORS. The total number of students reported was 82,045 studying in 1859 institutions. The number of countries represented was 159, more than ever before. Institutions with the greatest numbers were (1) University of California 4,393, (2) New York University 2,986, (3) Columbia University 2,353 (Cornell ranked 12th). Howard University again had the highest percentage of foreign students (16.4%) followed by M.I.T. (12.8%) and Columbia University (9.3%). Cornell, with 7.7% ranked 4th along with the University of Chicago. Enrollment in the field of Engineering, graduate and undergraduate, continues to lead with 18,084 or 22%, followed by the humanities with 16,083 or 19.6%. Agriculture had the least number with 3,211 or 3.9%. The greatest number of graduate students are again found in the natural and physical sciences (8,914). The Far East continues to dominate the area representation with 29,400 or 36% of all foreign students. Africa with 6,800 students, continues to show the fastest rate of increase (12%).
