RUDOLPH J. ANDERSON

A former Experiment Station professor who went to Yale University from Geneva, died at his home in New Haven last week. He is Rudolph J. Anderson, professor emeritus of Chemistry, at Yale University. Dr. Anderson was at the Station from about 1910 to 1926, at which time he became the Sterling Professor of Chemistry at Yale. He worked in the Chemistry department here and resided on North Street across from the Chemistry building. After moving to Yale he worked on special research on tuberculosis among other things. He retired from Yale in 1948. His widew survives.
