#### IN THE HUDSON VALLEY

Several members of the Staff are in Kingston this week for the eastern meeting of the State Horticultural Society. Leading off at 10:00 o'clock this morning will be Dr. J. M. Hamilton with a discussion of old and new fungicides for 1943 to be followed by Dr. R. F. Suit on the control of diseases of small fruits in 1943. Dr. R. W. Dean and James Brann, Station entomologists at the Poughkeepsie laboratory, and Ellsworth Wheeler will take part in a general discussion of wartime adjustments in insect control programs for the Hudson Valley. This afternoon Dr. Heinicke will discuss wartime care of orchards and will then lead a discussion on horticultural problems in general. Tomorrow Dr. Oscar Hammer, formerly entomologist at the Poughkeepsie laboratory and now with the Dow Chemical Company at Midland, Mich., will appear on the program, and in the evening Dr. Tukey will give an account of the trip he made during his sabbatical leave. He will also conduct the "Question Box" during the meeting.

In the joint educational exhibit from Ithaca and Geneva, the Station will have a fruit juice demonstration with Dr. Pederson in charge, a display of dehydrated foods, the usual apple variety collection, a publications exhibit, Dr. Suit's fruit disease "Quiz", and a display on fruit insect pest control. The program and exhibits extend over three days.
