William Moffett, Editor of the Eastern Grape Grower magazine, gave an overview of research in viticulture and enology, emphasizing the role of the Geneva Station and the effects of budgetary limitations on research.

Len Mattick and Richard Nelson, Food Science, attended the American Society of Enologists annual meeting held in San Diego, CA July 25-28. Len presented a paper at the meeting.

David Soderlund, Entomology, traveled to Edison, NJ on July 16 for a consultation meeting with Mobil Chemical Company.

VISITORS

A group of 16 Japanese pomologists visited the Station on July 6 and toured Pomology and Viticulture facilities. Professor H. Iwagaki at the Tokyo Noko University was the organizer of the U. S. tour.

Dr. John Jackson, Head of the Pomology Section at the East Malling Research Station in England, visited the Department of Pomology and Viticulture on July 23-24.

Dr. Jay Jacobson, plant physiologist with the Boyce Thompson Institute, visited Bob Musselman and Walt Kender on July 26 to discuss plans for a joint project relating to acid precipitation.

Dr. James Flore, Michigan State University, visited Alan Lakso and other members of the Department of Pomology and Viticulture on July 25 and 26 to discuss cooperative research involving fruit tree physiology.

Dr. David L. Mulcahy, Associate Professor of Botany at the University of Massachusetts, recently spent a week at the Experiment Station observing techniques used by Jerzy Puchalski and Dick Robinson for isolating and identifying isozymes. The three scientists are trying to develop a procedure that can be used on individual pollen grains.

Dr. Sal J. Locascio, Department of Vegetable Crops, University of Florida, Gainesville, visited members of Seed and Vegetable Sciences on July 11.

Majid Rahemi of Iran is spending 3 weeks with Roger Way. Mr. Rahemi has received his M.S. degree from Michigan State University under Dr. Robert L. Anderson. He will spend his time at Geneva studying sour cherries.

T. Domeney of Tasmania, Australia spent July 10 and 11 with Roger Way. Mr. Domeney is a fruit grower in Tasmania who was visiting the United States on a traveling scholarship which he won by writing a proposal suggesting increased growing of cherries in Tasmania. This is important because Tasmania has lost much of its apple market due to the European Economic Community (Common Market). This scholarship was sponsored by the Eli Lilly Chemical Company in Indiana.





STATION CLUB SOFTBALL




STATION CLUB SOFTBALL
