ROBERT BECKER RECEIVES AWARD

Robert F. Becker, associate professor in the Department of Horticultural Sciences and an extension specialist, received two awards at the 1992 New York State Vegetable and Direct Marketing Conference held January 27-29 at the Genesee Plaza Holiday Inn, Rochester, New York.

Carol MacNeil, Cooperative Extension Agent, and this year's planning committee chairperson, commented that Bob had been responsible for



chairing these statewide vegetable conferences from 1967 until just last year. Carol presented a plaque to Bob at the conference banquet and thanked him for his many years of dedicated service and outstanding leadership. Bob also received some appropriate gifts, a working sweet com telephone and a set of heirloom vegetable seed packet placemats.

The second award was given to him following the conference's cabbage session, by Clifford Kunes, Jr., President of the New York State Cabbage Research Association, in appreciation for Bob's 33 years of service to the New York State Cabbage Industry.

"I was really amazed," Bob said, "to receive both of these unexpected awards, and I appreciate being honored by the members of the New York State Cabbage Research Association and the Vegetable Conference Planning Committee."

Bob has been with Cornell University since 1959 and works primarily with commercial vegetable growers and food processors in New York State, conducting extension programs and doing variety evaluation, fertility, and tillage research.

A related interest of Bob's is the history of vegetable production and heirloom vegetable varieties. He has taught classes on this subject to horticultural students at Cornell, and has consulted with a number of living history farms and other historic sites over the past dozen years. He is also currently chairman of the Seeds and Plants Committee for the Association of Living Historic Farms and Agricultural Museums.

Bob lives in Rushville, New York with his wife, Fay. They have three grown children and five grandchildren.

JOHN WATSON, FORMER POMOLOGIST DIES

John P. Watson, 69, 1992 County Road 23, Phelps died Tuesday morning at his home following an extended illness. He was a former fruit breeder in Horticultural Sciences.

Funeral arrangements are being handled by the Eacker Funeral Home, East Main Street, Phelps. A memorial service will be held at a date to be announced. Burial will be at the convenience of the family.

In lieu of flowers, friends may make contributions to the American Cancer Society; the American Lung Association; the New York State Fruit Testing Cooperative Association, Hedrick Hall, Geneva, NY; or to an educational institution of their choice.

John was born on October 21, 1922 in Worcester, Massachusetts. He was awarded his bachelor of science degree from the University of Massachusetts in 1948 and his master of science degree from Rutgers University in 1950. Before coming to the Geneva Station on July 1, 1950, he spent time in Florida, Georgia, Texas, and Colorado with the United States Army.

His responsibilities at the Geneva Station were to evaluate and improve through breeding varieties of grape and plum for New York and the Northeastern United States. With plums, he planned and made crosses between various varieties and selections to produce seedlings of potential value in the marketplace. With the large grape program at the Station, John was in charge of the care of seedling vineyards and assisted in planning and making crosses of potential grape varieties. He also helped to evaluate the breeding and commercial value of these crosses.

He worked closely with the New York State Department of Agriculture and Markets and the New York State Fruit Testing Cooperative Association, Inc. to establish virus free grape clones that could be increased and made available for distribution. At the time of his retirement on November 20, 1987, John was a Senior Research Support Specialist.

He was highly respected by fellow fruit breeders throughout the country. During his 37 years at the Station, he was involved in the introduction of 17 varieties of grape, including Cayuga White, Einset Seedless, and Chardonel, and the Iroquois, Seneca, Oneida, and Mohawk plums. In 1988, a new raspberry introduced by the Geneva Station was named *Watson* in his honor. He also was named Outstanding Employee at the Experiment Station in 1987.

John is survived by his wife, Judy; eight children: Richard, San Dimas, California; John, Poughkeepsie, New York; Lois, San Jose, California; Susan, Depauville, New York; Benjamin, Bolling Air Force Base, Washington, D.C.; Judith, Clifton Springs, New York; Ruth, Rochester, New York; and William, Mountain Home Air Force Base, Idaho.

Also surviving are two brothers: Robert, Auburn, Massachusetts and Benjamin, Worcester, Massachusetts; a sister, Martha, Worcester, Massachusetts; 12 grandchildren; a great granddaughter; and several nieces, nephews, grandnieces, and grandnephews.
