NEW DEPARTMENT FORMED

A new research department becomes operational April 1, 1974 by authority of the Cornell University Board of Trustees.

This new department is the combination of the Departments of Seed Investigations and Vegetable Crops and will officially be known as the Department of Seed and Vegetable Sciences. Appointed Head of the Department is Dr. M. T. Vittum who will assume his responsibilities beginning May 1, 1974 upon his return from Sabbatic Leave. His term of appointment is for 5 years beginning April 1, 1974. During April, Dr. G. A Marx is serving as Acting Head of the new Department.

Numerous advantages will result from the merger of these two research departments. There will be a distinct administrative advantage in consolidating the management of personnel and research under direction of one department head. Resources will be combined into a larger, more efficient unit and the sharing of field equipment and facilities will be easier and more prevalent in a single department. Perhaps most important is the fact that the merger brings together two staffs with great similarity in research interests and clientele.
