EDITORIAL.

Now that in the dormitories we have just shaken hands at the new sign-up system, it may be well to stand off and eye our new acquaintance critically.

Upon first sight it may seem that this elaborate ticketing of us and our doings is an encroachment upon our freedom. But, what is freedom? A law is like the last analysis a protection for the freedom of the free. Applying it: we made our Student Government laws. They are the expression of our majority will, and they were formulated according to what the best judgment we could give called right. Now in case of infringement we break the dictates of our own will.
