PESTICIDE CORE AND CERTIFICATION EXAMS



SUSAN BROWN RECEIVES NEW YORK FARMERS CLUB AWARD

t a black tie dinner on April 14, Susan Brown was honored with the Outstanding Research Award of the New York Farmers Club. The presentation took place at the Union Club in New York City. Brown, Station apple breeder in the Department of Horticultural Sciences, was accompanied by Dean Daryl B. Lund to the annual affair held by the Farmers Club, an organization founded in 1882.

The Outstanding Research Award is rotated among the College of Veterinary Medicine at the University of Pennsylvania, Cook College of Rutgers University, the College of Agriculture and Natural Resources at the University of Connecticut, and the College of Agriculture and Life Sciences at Cornell.



"Susan was very gracious in receiving
the Outstanding Research medal and identified how important the Farmers Club's contributions are for student support at CALS," said Dean Lund. Most of the contributions from the Club received by Cornell are used for student support. The Farmers Club makes contributions annually to the above colleges and to the College of Agriculture and Natural Resources at the University of Massachusetts to support the highest priorities recognized by the deans.

Brown was honored for her research in the area of apple breeding and for her use of both traditional and molecular research techniques. The award was also recognition of the importance of new apple varieties to New York farmers. Dean Lund remarked that he nominated Brown with the full concurrence of Station Director Jim Hunter. "This award was a very appropriate way to recognize Susan's contributions during her relatively short time here at Cornell," he said. "She joined the University in 1985, but she has been very significant in moving the apple breeding program and keeping it at the highest level, both nationally and internationally."

Geneva Horticultural Sciences Department Chair, Hugh Price agreed. "Under Dr. Brown's leadership, the Cornell apple breeding program continues to be the premier program in North America," he said. "Eating quality, both at harvest and after long term storage, is a major objective. The integration of genetic studies and biotechnology with conventional breeding is an on-going process that Dr. Brown is using to develop the next generation of apple varieties for New York."

In addition to traditional breeding for taste quality, projects in Brown's program include screening seedlings for the malic acid gene, the lack of which produces bland apples; disease

This year, a collection of ornamental apple selections (courtesy of Jim Cummins' breeding program) will be dedicated to the memory of Professor Robert Lamb, deceased member of the Department of Horticultural Sciences.

Soon after Bob's death in March of 1997, the Geneva Arboretum Association began receiving correspondence from both Station and non-Station folks stating that it would be appropriate to develop a group planting of ornamental apples to recognize Bob's many contributions to the Station community and to the breeding and

release of apple varieties and other tree fruit at the Station. After visiting the Cummins collection on

the Denton Farm with Jim and Mike Dickson during bloom time and also during the fall, Barbara Lamb helped pick out three tree selections that should grow into showy ornamentals. With the help of FRU, the Station's grounds staff, and Bob Andersen and his rented

tree digger, the trees were transplanted last fall to the West Lawn site. After making some pruning cuts they are already beginning to leaf out in time for our ceremony.

Everyone is invited to attend this celebration of Arbor

Day and Bob Lamb's memory. A walking tour of the Station's plantings with members of the Station's Geneva Arboretum Association will follow the ceremony if weather permits.
