



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A TRIBUTE TO THE DIRECTOR

"Tribute to Arthur John Heinicke—Teacher, Scientist, Administrator". Thus reads the caption to an award made to Doctor Heinicke last Thursday evening as a highlight of the annual meeting of the New York State Horticultural Society, the Empire State Potato Club, and the New York State Vegetable Growers Association. The beautifully illuminated and hand-inscribed document bears the signatures of the Presidents of the three organizations and testifies to the high esteem in which the recipient is held by the fruit and vegetable growers of the State. The presentation was made by the Honorable Don Wickham, Commissioner of Agriculture. The general consensus of opinion of growers attending the four-day session was that the meetings and exhibits were highly satisfactory, and so far as the fruit growers are concerned it is to be Rochester again in 1961.

NEW VARIETY WELL ADAPTED TO PO VALLEY

Dr. Gianpaolo Silvestre, one of the Italians who visited the Station in September 1958 recently wrote about the results of his trial planting of the Geneva II tomato. He was interested in this Station tomato and took some seeds back with him to test. He writes: "From the data obtained in 1959, the variety Geneva II is far superior to other varieties tested for productivity and for industrial purposes, and shows the best adaptation to the environment of the Po Valley, the most fertile region of North Italy." Dr. Silvestre wants to introduce it on a larger scale in this region and is asking for 5 pounds of seeds. Dr. Silvestre is at the Esperimental Station for the Food Preservation Industry at Parma, Italy. The variety Geneva II is highly productive and resistant to verticillium wilt and late blight. It was developed here at the Station by Drs. Schroeder and Tapley.

HOME FROM 6 MONTHS SABBATIC
