## WORK BEGINS ON NEW STATION WAREHOUSE BUILDING

Preparation work is well under way for a new 13,300-square foot campus warehouse structure to be built just east of the Farm Services building on the Station grounds near PreEmption Road.

The building will be used for much-needed storage space for supplies and materials used by a number of Station departments and units, both research and support in nature. It will also serve as a central receiving area for delivery of supplies.

The single-story, cinder-block building is expected to be completed by September of this year. It is being funded by the State University of New York Building Fund.

## STATION LIBRARY EXPANSION PROJECT TO START IN MID-APRIL

Library facilities at the Station, currently housed on the first floor of Jordan Hall with an annex on Jordan's lower level, will soon be expanded to include an additional 1,100 square feet on the Hall's second floor.

Previously devoted to a lounge-conference area, the west end of the large room next to the Jordan Hall Auditorium will be given over to the Library. Work is scheduled to begin about April 14 and will last about two months. Construction will be done by Station B&P tradesmen.

Two offices will be devoted to space for the library's computerized automation program, with direct links to University library facilities in Ithaca. There will be a study area as well as much-needed additional shelf space for publications. In the library's main quarters, space will be created for an additional public-access computer terminal for the convenience of library users.

Librarian Mary Van Buren said that an assistant librarian will be added to the Geneva staff in about a month. She is Bau-Mei Jeng, a native of Taiwan who

holds a Master of Library Science degree from SUNY Buffalo. Jeng is currently participating in a training program at Mann Library, Cornell Ithaca, and will join Jeanne Samimy in providing assistance to Library visitors as well as other responsibilities.

Individuals planning to use conference facilities in Jordan Hall during the construction stage of the Library expansion may call extension 248 for further details. Disruption of normal facilities is expected to be minimal.
