 - III. A Total Eclipse of the Moon, November 26th, partly visible at Greenwich.
 - IV. A Partial Eclipse of the Sun, December 12th, invisible at Greenwich.

An Inland Letter must not exceed the dimensions of 2 feet in length, 1 foot in width, and 1 foot in depth.

BOOK PACKETS.

Every 2 oz. or fraction of 2 oz. 1d.
No Book Packet may exceed 2 feet in length, 1 foot in width, and 1 foot in depth.

NEWSPAPERS.

For every Newspaper whether posted singly or in a packet..1d.

A Packet containing two or more Papers is not chargeable with a higher rate of postage than would be chargeable upon a book packet of the same weight.

INLAND PARCEL POST.

Not exceeding— 3 lbs. in weight .. 5d.
1 lb. in weight .. 8d. 5 lbs. .. 6d.
2 lbs. .. 4d. 7 lbs. .. 7d.

Every additional lb. or part of a lb. .. 1d.
Parcels must not exceed 11 lbs. in weight, nor measure more than 3 feet 6 inches in length, or 6 feet length and girth combined.

INTEREST TABLE FOR ONE YEAR.

On Friday the Commissioner of Foreign Affairs came to say that he wanted a certain change made in the draft we had prepared the day before. This I said I could not make without referring to New York. He belly-ached but I told him that my reply would probably reach me today. As a result of your wire I this morning wrote saying nothing doing till Monday. Then the Interpreter came rushing down said that the Viceroy and Governor wanted to wire the agreement to Peking for approval. I pointed out that this was hardly playing the game when they had promised to sign subject to approval by Edict. I came here, the Interpreter and the Commissioner of Foreign Affairs both came down, and said that the telegram had already gone. It would appear that the Viceroy had wired that he had signed and taken the risk of doing so without Peking's approval. He feared that if we did not close today Peking might jack him up and that he would be obliged to delay indefinitely. Since this was the situation, and it appeared that we might lose certainly a great deal of time and perhaps the whole show an opportunity that would not return I told them that I would sign and did so without authorization from New York. I had telegraphed yesterday, "Unless differently instructed will sign tomorrow". No word yet. So perhaps my first and last signature as representative of the Group has been registered. It was a long chance but it seemed up to me. This goes by Bland. I shall wait for ffrench and probably come on Monday morning, reaching Peking by the express Tuesday morning. I shall wire on leaving Shanhaikuan.

On Friday the Commissioner of F. A. came here and wanted to make a minor change in the Loan provisions. This I said I would have to refer, I said I thought that my answer would come today. Without waiting for further word from me the Viceroy wired the whole thing to Peking this morning. I notified the F. O. early that you were coming and that we could sign on Monday. At noon the F.O. sent a man down and said the Viceroy wanted to refer the question to Peking. I told them that this was not playing the game and that they had promised to sign first. ~~THEMXXI~~ strongly objected to their referring it while you were on the way up. The man said he would report to the Viceroy. He returned in half an hour saying that the telegram had gone off early this morning but that if I would sign today it would be all right for they would then be without instructions and could act for themselves. A few minutes later the Commissioner of F.A. turned up. He begged me to sign today at once for he said there might all sorts of difficulties crop up if we did not act quickly. With my eye on Na Tung I decided, notwithstanding my slim authority from you, to go ahead. My wire from New York had not come but I had said that unless differently instructed I should sign. They had plenty of time to stop me and I went ahead. The contract as you will see is so general that there is an easy way to get out by insisting on impossible terms if it be desirable to do so. 



THE CALENDARS.

The Jewish is in accordance with the system arranged A.D. 358. The Calendar dates from the Creation, which is fixed as 3760 years and 3 months before the beginning of the Christian Era; the year is Luni-solar.

The *Mohammedan*, or era of the Hejira, dates from the day after Mahomet's flight from Mecca, which occurred on the night of July 15, 622 A.D. The months are Lunar.

The *Fasli* year was derived from a combination of the Hejira and Samvat years by the order of Akbar; it is Luni-solar.

The *Bengali* year seems also to have been related at one time to the Hejira, but the fact of its being Solar made it lose 11 days each year.

THE CALENDARS—contd.

The Samvat era dates from 57 B.C., and is Luni-solar. The months are divided into two fortnights—*sudi*, or bright, and *badi*, or dark. Each fortnight contains 15 tithis, which furnish the dates of the civil days given in our calendars.

Post Cards.—Single, $\frac{1}{4}$ anna; reply, $\frac{1}{2}$ anna. **Letters.**—Not exc. 1 tola, $\frac{1}{2}$ anna; exc. 1 tola but not exc. 10 tolas, 1 anna; for every add. 10 tolas or fraction, 1 anna. **Packets, Publications of all kinds, Newspapers, Books and Patterns.**—For every 10 tolas, or part of that weight, $\frac{1}{2}$ anna. **Registered Newspapers.**—Not exc. 8 tolas, $\frac{1}{4}$ anna; exc. 8 tolas but not exc. 40 tolas, $\frac{1}{2}$ anna; for every add. 40 tolas or part, $\frac{1}{2}$ anna. **Parcels.**—Not exc. 400 tolas, for every 40 tolas or part of that weight, 2 annas; exc. 400 tolas but not exc. 480 tolas, 3 rupees; for every add. 40 tolas or fraction, up to 800 tolas, 4 annas. Parcels weighing more than 400 tolas and not more than 800 tolas, limit of weight, must be registered.

Commission on Ordinary Inland Money Orders.—On any sum not exc. 5 rupees, 1 anna; exc. 5 rupees, but not exc. 10 rupees, 2 annas; exc. 10 rupees, but not exc. 15 rupees, 3 annas; exc. 15 rupees, but not exc. 25 rupees, 4 annas; exc. 25 rupees, up to 600 rupees, 4 annas for each complete sum of 25 rupees and 4 annas for the remainder, provided that, if the remainder does not exc. 5 rupees, the charge for it shall be only 1 anna; if it does not exc. 10 rupees, the charge for it shall be only 2 annas; and if it does not exc. 15 rupees, the charge for it shall be only 3 annas.

Telegraphic Money Orders, Inland.—A fee for the issue of a telegraphic money order will be charged at the rate of commission on an ordinary inland money order for the same amount, added to a telegraph charge calculated at the rates for inland telegrams for the actual number of words used in the telegram advising the remittance, according as the telegram is to be sent as an "Express" or as an "Ordinary" message.

Money Orders expressed in Rupees up to the value of 600 rupees may be drawn on—British East Africa Protectorate (including Uganda Protectorate), British North Borneo (Jesselton), Ceylon, Corea (certain places), Federated Malay States, Formosa (certain places), German East Africa, Hongkong (British Offices), Japan, Japanese Agencies in China and Manchuria, Mauritius, Sarawak, Seychelles, Siam, Somaliland Protect, (certain places), Straits Settlements (including Labuan), Zanzibar, Portuguese India (*Goa and Damman*). Money Orders can also be drawn on the following Native States:—Chamba, Gwalior, Jhind, Nabha and Patiala; limit of value, 600 rupees. Inland rates of commission apply to these Orders.

Telegraphic Money Orders expressed in rupees may be exchanged with Ceylon. Limit of value is 600 rupees.

Registration Fee.—For each Letter, Post Card, Book or Pattern Packet, or Parcel to be registered, 2 annas.

Acknowledgment Fee.—For each article registered, 1 anna.

Insurance.—Registered letters, value-payable registered letters, registered parcels, and value-payable registered parcels may be insured up to the value of 500 rupees in branch offices, and up to 2,000 rupees in other offices; when the value insured does not exceed 50 rupees, 1 anna; for every additional 50 rupees, or fraction, 1 anna.

Value-Payable Fees.—Amount specified for remittance to sender.—The same rates of fees as for Ordinary Inland Money Orders.
