

RUSSIAN INFORMATION TEAM ARRIVES

An eight-man, high level Russian Agricultural Information team, plus interpreters, arrived at the Station this morning. They were met by Director Barton who gave them a brief talk outlining the work of the Experiment Station Following Doctor Barton's talk they toured the pilot plant where the apple sauce line was in operation. From the pilot plant they went to the Rootstock Farm, and from there to the Canning Crops Farm.

The Russians are members of the USSR group of visitors to the U. S. under the Cultural Exchange of "Science and Information" personnel. They are the Russian counterpart of the American team which visited Russia recently.

VISITOR FROM SWITZERLAND

Dr. Emil Zullig, Director and Instructor of a technical Training College of Advanced Studies for higher technical personnel and managerial posts in the fruit processing industry in Switzerland, arrived at the Station on Tuesday for a three day visit. Dr. Zullig is sponsored by the Europeans Productivity Agency and will be in the state for about three months. Dr. Zullig will spend his time here at the Station with Station Food scientists and pomologists and will visit processing plants in western New York and in the Finger Lakes area.
