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C. R. BIGELOW RETIRES

Official announcement has been made of the retirement of C. R. Bigelow, Department of Food Science and Technology. He first came to the Experiment Station in February, 1938 as a chemist in the Feed and Fertilizer Control Laboratory. With the exception of one year, 1939, when he engaged in advanced study at Cornell University, he worked as a chemist in this same general field until his retirement.

Bigelow received both his B. S. and M. A. degrees in chemistry and biology from Hobart College. He later attended Carnegie Institute of Technology, Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, to study metallurgy and then returned to Hobart for some additional work in his original specialty.

An extremely faithful and proud investigator, Bigelow had a continuing interest in Station activities and devoted a great deal of his energies toward supporting the Station Club. He is also an extremely active member of the Episcopal Church, having served as a Vestryman for a number of years, and is a devoted Sunday school teacher.

His other activities include membership in Rotary Club. He is a past—President of the Waterloo organization, and upon transferring to the Geneva club some years ago became its Secretary, a position he still holds. He is an accomplished piano player and at one time taught music. He often led group singing at Station functions.

Bigelow and his wife, Frances, have one child, Beth, who is attending William Smith College. The Bigelows plan to spend their retirement at their home on Highland Avenue
