Herb Aldwinckle was among several scientists taking part in the Monsanto Company's "Biotechnology for Agriculture" roundtable held in Albany late in '89. He was one of three members of the initial panel discussion which concerned biotechnological plant development.

Among other speakers at the roundtable were State Ag & Markets Commissioner Richard McGuire; Ralph Hardy, president of the Boyce Thompson Institute; Charles Wille, president of the NY Farm Bureau, and several others including Cornell faculty members from Ithaca.



Aldwinckle discussed research on apples that hopefully will lead to beneficial traits such as resistance to weather, insects and disease and possibly faster ripening time.
