TENNIS COURTS.

The tennis courts at Prudence Risley, Sage and the Athletic field are for the use of the girls. Until further notice, it will be permissable to invite men to play on the courts up to four o'clock, unless there are girls waiting to play, but after four o'clock the courts are reserved absolutely for the girls. It is up to the girls themselves to see that this rule is observed.

The combinations for the gigs are posted on the Gym bulletin board. Those girls whose names are checked off, are eligible to go on the water. Every girl must look at the schedule immediately and see when her hours come and if not checked off provide a substitute. All girls should be weighed in Miss Canfield's office beforehand.
