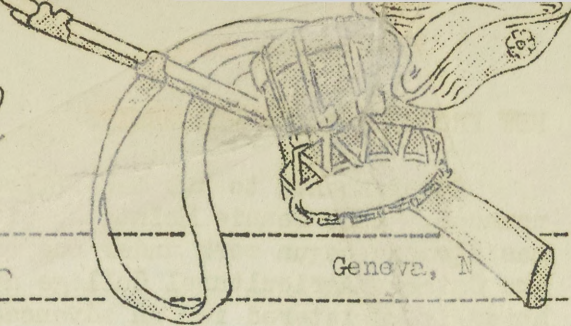

Mr. Sayre entered Strong Memorial Hospital in Rochester last Sunday to undergo an operation this week.

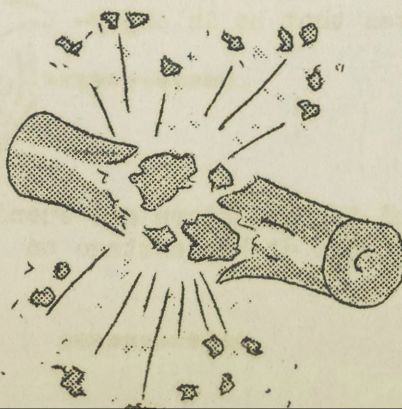
IN BATH HOSPITAL
