A NEW : The Station is about to embark upon a new research project with a new mem-PROJECT: ber of the Staff to head it up. Technically, the project is designated as "Studies of the Microflora of Surface-ripened Cheeses" and the investigations are being financed from the Bankhead-Jones fund recently authorized by Congress for researches at the state experiment stations into new fields. For the present, an effort will be made to work out the relations between the growth of micro-organisms and the ripening of cheese of the type of limburger, brick, Oka, Port Salut, etc., with the expectation that later the project will include a study of methods of correcting defects in present manufacturing processes and the development of new types of surface-ripened cheeses. The funds become available the first of December and work will begin on the project at once. The new addition to the Staff is not new to Geneva and the Station, however, for it is to be Dr. C. D. Kelly who has been associated with the Station for various periods during recent years. Dr. Kelly comes to the Station this time from Portland, Maine, where he was bacteriologist for Old Tavern Farms, Inc. The Kellys are expected to arrive in Geneva early next week and will make their home in Miss Brooks' apartments. The NEWS takes pleasure in saying, "Welcome home", to the Kellys.

ON HIS: Simultaneously with the announcement of Dr. Kelly's appointment to the WAY: Station Staff comes word of the departure today of Mr. Chilson for Portland, ----: Maine, where he will take over Dr. Kelly's duties at the Old Tavern Farms. Mr. Chilson has been assisting in the Bacteriology Division in connection with graduate work at Cornell.

of interest to be visited by those who attend these meetings.
