## REPORT OF THE COMPTROLLER

*To the Board of Trustees of Cornell University:*

The highlights of the fiscal year July 1, 1938 to June 30, 1939 are as follows:

In the Endowed Colleges at Ithaca, current income exceeded current expenditures by \$2,091.38.

The Medical College (a separate accounting unit) had, as was anticipated, a net deficit of \$17,455.98. This was charged against its accumulated surplus of prior years, reducing that item to \$35,199.65.

The 1938 Summer Session resulted in a loss of \$1,151.72 which was absorbed by the University.

The Colleges of Agriculture, Home Economics, Veterinary Medicine, and the Experiment Station all lived within their income.

The Balance Sheet has been improved by the elimination of the accumulated operating deficit of the Endowed Colleges at Ithaca of \$565,770.08, and of the accumulated advances made for additions to the educational plant of \$883,472.13. By action of the Board of Trustees, these sums were charged against the Cornell Endowment Fund, one of the wholly unrestricted funds that is at the disposition of the Trustees.

The operations of the University's consolidated endowment investments resulted in an average rate of return of 4.0073% on book values. This compares with 4.2867% for the previous year. The tendency is still discouragingly downward. There was a slight improvement over the previous year in the aggregate market value of the endowment investments, and the Reserve against losses was increased from \$599,359.29 to \$684,979.39.

The budgetary rate of 4.25% that was guaranteed by the Finance Committee for the fiscal year 1938-39 against an actual return earned of 4.0073%, necessitated a charge of \$67,036.54 against our Income Stabilization account, leaving a balance as of July 1, 1939 of \$313,279.55.

Gifts and donations for the year totaled \$1,013,558.11. These are listed in detail on page 168. Of these, \$508,777.44 were added to permanent endowments, or are being carried as capital sums.

Appended also are detailed reports of the Treasurer, Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds, Manager of Purchases, Manager of Residential Halls, Comstock Publishing Co., Inc., and the Cornell Research Foundation, Inc.

*To the Board of Trustees of Cornell University:*

We have made an examination of the accounts and financial records of the Endowed Colleges of Cornell University and of Cornell Medical College for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1939. In connection therewith we examined or tested accounting records and other supporting evidence covering receipts and disbursements, obtained information and explanations from officers and employees of the University, and made a general review of the accounting methods, but we did not make a detailed audit of the transactions.

Investment securities and cash balances at June 30, 1939 have been verified by actual inspection or satisfactory confirmation.

Endowment fund securities and investment real estate are carried at book values representing cost or, in some instances, at various bases such as cost plus carrying and foreclosure charges on real estate, cost of substituted securities plus realized shrinkage in market value on securities for which substitution was made, market values at various dates, and market, par or appraised values at date of acquisition through gift.

Consistent provision for depreciation has been made only on the faculty apartments and garages, representing a small portion of the investment real estate, and on the heating and water systems.

In our opinion, based upon such examination and accepting the valuations of securities and properties as stated above, the accompanying balance sheet, as prepared by the Treasurer, sets forth the financial condition of the University as at June 30, 1939.

## EXHIBIT D: SUMMARY OF INCOME AND EXPENDITURES

For accounting purposes the University is separated into six divisions: A, the Endowed Colleges in Ithaca; B, the Medical College in New York; C, the Veterinary College; D, the College of Agriculture; E, the College of Home Economics; F, the Agricultural Experiment Station at Geneva, New York.

In subdivision A, which for accounting purposes may be termed the University, are included many general items of income and expense which inure to the benefit in a varying degree of the five other divisions, or to the use and benefit of the students registered in the colleges constituting these divisions. Some such items are the expense of the general administrative offices, the library, the infirmary, the residential halls, the upkeep of the campus and playgrounds, and the departments of music, hygiene, military, and physical training.

By action of the Board of Trustees, taken April 29, 1939, accumulated advances of \$884,974.35 that had been made for the acquisition of lands and buildings for the extension of the University at Ithaca, and of \$565,850.08 resulting from operating deficits during the years 1925 to 1937, were charges against this fund, with the promise that such charges may from time to time be restored from future unrestricted gifts.

# REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

*To the Comptroller:*

Following is the annual report of the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds for the year 1938-39:

## GENERAL

The Repair and Improvement policy of the Department for the University Buildings and Grounds has been followed throughout the year and accelerated as funds would permit. Emphasis has been laid on quality and economy.

## CARE OF BUILDINGS

Much work has been done during the past year in this branch of the department to generally improve the maintenance of the buildings. Tests of various materials have continued with the idea of determining the most satisfactory as well as economical methods of floor maintenance and considerable wall washing by the salaried staff, in place of painting, has been accomplished, thus reducing upkeep costs.

Some additional pieces of equipment have been purchased in order to expedite the work and other types are being demonstrated with the idea that eventually the department will be equipped to do the work prescribed still more economically.

Mr. John H. Kreinheder, B.S. in Commercial Engineering, Valparaiso University, 1933, was appointed in July 1938 as Superintendent of this division.

## CAMPUS PATROL

Through the past year, this department has operated to regulate traffic and parking as well as to protect the Upper and Lower Campuses from any vandalism. This patrol work covers approximately twenty hours per day with the exception of Sundays and University holidays and includes the exteriors of dormitories as well as academic buildings, the night patrolmen assuming the responsibility for the interiors.

During the past year, the night patrolmen have all been put in uniform. This gives a better appearance and allows their recognition as responsible employees.

For years past, it has been necessary for these men to carry an innumerable number of keys in order to admit them to the various rooms in case of necessity. In order to alleviate this condition, it has been decided to put the entire Lower Campus on a master key system and a program has been worked out for all the buildings. Some work to this end has been done and more is scheduled.

The Library, Morrill and Boardman Halls are partially equipped. The Sibleys, Franklin and Lincoln Halls, being considered as temporary structures, will be excluded from the program.

Key filing cabinets have been purchased and will be distributed to the Dean's offices where local records will be kept of the key distribution as soon as the building involved is completed. This work is under the direct supervision of the Executive Officer of the Campus Patrol.

## REPAIRS TO BUILDINGS—CONSTRUCTION

The usual amount of work has been done this year by the Repairs Division in maintaining the physical plant. The program of the previous year for putting the buildings in better physical condition has been closely followed and much effort has been expended on the pointing of masonry, painting and roof repairs. In addition, a great deal of work has been done on major improvements and new construction such as the new Service Building and Physiological Field Station.

### NEW CONSTRUCTION AND IMPROVEMENTS

The Service Building of reinforced concrete and brick construction with steel frame fireproof roof for the housing of College Stores and the service shops is located just west of the new Heating Plant and was constructed at a cost of \$80,000.00. Work was begun in February 1938 and the entire structure was completed in October of the same year. The mason, electric, tinsmith, and plumbing shops were moved in during the month of November and the College Stores during the Christmas vacation.

The basement floor is being used by the Trucking Department for garage purposes and for the Grounds Department shop and equipment storage. The second floor is occupied by College Stores and the shops of the Buildings and Grounds Department except the paint and carpenter shops. The Typewriter division also has quarters at the Service Building.

This structure has filled a long needed want and has made it possible for College Stores to carry many of the supplies used by the Department of Buildings and Grounds which heretofore could not be included in their stock because of lack of space.

The Physiological Field Station, for the study of the behavior of animals, located west of Varna on what is known as the Lamkin Farm, is of cinder block construction with wood frame roof, and was constructed at a cost of \$12,231.46 from funds furnished in the majority by the Rockefeller Foundation, the balance being taken from University appropriation.

The work was started on this project in March 1938 and the building was ready for occupancy at the beginning of the fall term.

A considerable amount of work in the nature of alterations was also done on the Lamkin House, in close proximity to the Field Station, to make it available as a residence for the doctor in charge of the station.

The major improvements on the Campus involved, in part, the extensive alterations in Sibley Dome, paving the balance of Campus Road and creating an enlarged parking area and widening of Tower Road to the south of Stimson and Boardman Halls. In addition, a considerable amount of work was done on the installation of a new electric service in Rockefeller Hall to take care of the many additional pieces of equipment which have been installed over the past few years, and divorce the lighting from the power requirements.

### ELECTRIC SERVICE

This department has operated more or less the same as in previous years in maintaining the electric service in all the University buildings.

There have, however, been many changes made throughout the academic buildings with the idea of providing better illumination; also new construction and changes made necessary by alterations.

### TRUCKING DEPARTMENT

This department has had an exceedingly busy year. With all the construction, alteration and repair work going on, much depends on the trucking service given.

In addition, all trucks, cars, and automotive equipment used by the Department of Buildings and Grounds, as well as by some other departments, are kept in operating condition by the mechanics in this department.

Through the income derived from this source, all expenses, including salaries, are paid and a sufficient amount is transferred each year to a Reserve account out of which all departmental cars and trucks are purchased.

### UPPER CAMPUS

Much work has again been done this year on the Upper Campus both of a maintenance and new construction nature. Painting has been done on the exterior of Bailey Hall, Roberts, East Roberts and Stone Halls, the Engineering Laboratory, and the window frames on Agricultural Economics and a portion of the Home Economics Building. A new retaining wall was constructed at the slaughter room entrance to the Animal Husbandry Building and the usual repairs to the various

barns were made as well as a considerable amount of repairs and changes to the Poultry Department plant. In addition a new picture screen was installed in Bailey Hall and toilet facilities were made available at the Fish Hatchery.

The Old Insectary which was replaced by a new and more adequate one during the previous year was removed by a contractor and the area graded and will be seeded by W.P.A. labor.

Two bad fires occurred on the State Campus during the past two years. The horse barn burned in February 1938 and work was started on its replacement in April 1939 from funds furnished by the State. It is anticipated that it will be completed early in the fall of the coming year. This work is being done by this Department.

The sheep barn burned in October 1938 and was rebuilt during the following spring by Stafford and Bowdish of Cortland, New York, from insurance and other funds made available by the State College.

A considerable amount of work was also done on the exterior of all buildings such as painting, providing new offices, installing new lights and many other items, all with the idea of improving the building condition and teaching facilities.

#### VETERINARY COLLEGE

Through funds made available by the State and the Veterinary College, a large amount of work has been done in and around these buildings during the past year by this department. The construction of roads, walks, curbs, drainage and grading and seeding around the new laboratory constructed during the previous year at a cost of \$222,500.00 by C. F. Haglin & Son of Minneapolis, Minnesota, is well under way, a portion of the work being done by W.P.A. labor. In addition, considerable work has been done in reconditioning and remodelling James Law Hall and the installation of storm and sanitary sewers around the building.

#### ATHLETIC DIVISION

The Athletic Division and the Physical Education Department have contributed materially to the amount of work done by the Buildings and Grounds department during the past year.

The old wood fence around Hoy Field was removed and replaced by a chain link wire fence with ornamental stone entrance piers. The old ticket booths at the north and east of Schoellkopf were removed.

The traffic circle in front of the garage was curbed and paved, a parking area was made available east of the Stadium, on Kite Hill, the exterior of Schoellkopf building was painted, and a stockroom with storage for woollen apparel was constructed in the basement, the openings were enclosed at the north and south ends of the Crescent, the roof of Bacon Cage was repaired, an office for intramural sports was constructed in the Old Armory, some repairs were made on the concrete work on the Stadium, and many other items of more or less importance.

#### GROUNDS DEPARTMENT

Each year the work of this department involves general upkeep and improvement of the grounds. The roads, walks, lawns, and sanitary and storm sewers have received the usual amount of attention and additional paths were given a surface of Colprovia to further eliminate the old cinder paths.

The playing fields, as well as the lawns and roads under the jurisdiction of the Athletic Division, have all been maintained by this department and much improvement has been made over the entire plant. One tennis court on Upper Alumni field has been given an all-year surface by the Cork Turf Company of Utica, New York, and other hard-surfaced courts are contemplated for the coming year.

The gorges have been maintained as usual and new trails built from funds made available by the Sackett Gorge income. The trees and shrubs on the Campus have all received much care and pruning which was made possible through the income from the Sackett Landscape fund.

### LANDSCAPING

Through the past year, considerable planting and landscaping was done over the Campus in an effort to improve the general appearance of the University grounds.

In the rock garden south of Willard Straight, trails, water falls, a new stone water course and bridge were built. About fifty red pines in sizes ranging from eight feet to twelve feet were removed from city property and planted in various places around the Campus, as well as about thirty elms, fifteen red oaks and twelve evergreens. Planting has been accomplished around the Johnny Parson Club and much improvement made of a landscaping nature in the area comprising the Balch playgrounds.

At the nursery, about 5000 pieces of lining out stock have been planted for future use.

### POWER PLANT AND TRANSMISSION LINES

This department has operated through the year more or less along maintenance lines. No major improvements have been made and no severe storms have necessitated major repairs. Some poles, however, have necessarily had to be replaced and wiring renewed on both Campuses.

Due to new construction and alterations, new service has had to be installed and estimates have been furnished for all changes in lighting and power lines over both the State and Endowed Campuses.

The Power Plant has operated as usual but with the increased demands due to improved lighting conditions made over the past two years, the power generated has shown a decided increase.

### CENTRAL HEATING PLANT

The work started two years ago to put the Heating Plant in a better operating condition has been continued through the past year. Many items of both an improvement and repair nature have been done.

The original forced draft fan control on the west side of the plant has been replaced with a modern Bailey Meter control which we hope to expand by adding steam flow air flow stoker controls to the individual boilers.

A ten inch pipe line has been installed from the southeast surge tank to the feed water heater and so valved that it can be put in service in case of trouble with the original ten inch line in which the corrosion conditions are severe.

Trial runs were made with number four Buckwheat coal. The results indicated that with our present equipment it could not be burned as economically as our present fuel number three Buckwheat.

The Service Building heating approximately 5,000 square feet of radiation was added to the plant load.

As predicted in last year's report, Mr. Holmes W. Frederick assumed his duties as Assistant Superintendent of this division on August 8, 1938.

During the year, at the request of the Board of Trustees, a study was made by Professor F. O. Ellenwood of the Engineering College, to determine the feasibility of installing a steam turbine in the Heating Plant to be operated by excess steam pressure between the boilers and distributing system, the purpose being to supplement the hydro-electric plants during periods of low water.

### WATER WORKS

Continued improvements have been made at the Filter Plant and on the Transmission Lines during the past year. The No. 3 filter has been rebuilt and other miscellaneous repairs have been made in the plant in order to facilitate the work of operation. A new 20° incubator, water still and tank, and a sterilizer were purchased for the plant to assist in more effective control.

A new 8" water line with two hydrants was installed from Tower Road along Garden Avenue to Schoellkopf in order to furnish the Athletic Association water from the University system. A protective coating was put on the Reservoir roof and a thorough inspection was made of all water lines on both Campuses resulting in the location of several leaks and consequently reducing water wastage.

The water consumption, showing a 12.7% increase over the past year, has been as follows:

#### ARBORETUM

Considerable progress has been made on this project during the year 1938-39. With an average number of 160 C.C.C. boys available throughout the year, several thousand trees and plants have been planted, a nursery of approximately three and a half acres has been established in the Cascadilla valley and trails have been built through the woods south of the rifle range. The park road, where it connects with route 392, has been completed and many dry stone and masonry walls have been constructed. Preliminary work has been started on an 800 foot sea wall which is to be constructed west and north of the second Forest Home bridge and will extend downstream toward the Bool Dam for the purpose of confining the stream during flood stages and allow for development of the flat land area south and west of the creek previously inundated in periods of high water.

#### U. S. REGIONAL PLANT, SOIL AND NUTRITION LABORATORY

The first unit of this project, located at the extreme end of the Upper Campus on Tower Road, is being constructed of brick and concrete with steel framing and copper roof, at a cost of \$100,000.00 by the Fred. R. Comb Company of Minneapolis, Minnesota, from Government funds.

The structure is four stories high and approximately 40' x 80' and is to be used as a research laboratory for plant, soil and animal nutrition.

A second unit three stories high, to be the same size with a greenhouse on the roof, will be started this fall.

All preliminary work involving plans and specifications in connection with both units is being done by this department as well as the installation to the building of all utilities including steam, water, light, gas, telephone, storm and sanitary sewer connections.

The alterations in Morrill Hall, involving the Department of Buildings and Grounds, the Purchasing Department, the Comptrollers, and Residential Halls

offices were completed soon after July 1, 1938 and the Buildings and Grounds Department office moved into their new quarters in the basement during the same month.

While the improvement is very marked over conditions on the first floor, there is yet much to be desired. More space is needed to serve as offices for some of the supervisors who are located in areas outside the building. This necessitates extra office expense for clerical help, and the inconvenience of having these men so far removed from headquarters is detrimental to the efficient operation of the department as a whole. Inadequate light, ventilation, and dampness are offset in a measure by the comfortable temperatures which are enjoyed in ground floor or basement offices.

It is interesting to note that the amount of money spent for both maintenance and operation, including salaries and work done for other departments, on the Endowed Campus alone was \$688,707.48. On the State Campus a total of \$142,036.69 including statutory labor was expended, making a grand total for both Upper and Lower Campuses of \$830,744.17.

A decrease in the income from the Sale of Steam is again noted this year under last year of approximately 6.5%. This has been caused by a decrease in the rate of depreciation on the plant and equipment while an increase is shown in the Sale of Water over a year ago of 4.8%. It will be noted that since the year 1931-32 the cost of water consumed on the Endowed Campus has increased by 14.2% while that of the State Campus has shown a decrease of about 9%. The increase for both Campuses is 53%. According to the above figures, an increase will be noted over an eight-year period of 8% in steam consumption and 11.5% in the consumption of water.

An increase in the unit cost of janitor service on the State Campus of 1.9% over a year ago is shown by the above figures, with a decrease of 29% in material costs. An increase of approximately 25% will be noted in the consumption of electrical energy on the Endowed Campus over the previous year. This is the result of an effort to improve the general lighting conditions throughout the academic buildings as well as the continued installation of additional electric equipment in many of the laboratories. It is interesting to note that the total consumption on the Endowed Campus has increased by 176% over the past twenty years.

The total output of the two Hydro-Electric Plants inclusive of 230,300 KWH purchased from the New York State Electric and Gas Corporation has been 5,803,700 KWH for the current year. Of this amount, 2,153,600 KWH have been furnished to the New York State Gas and Electric Corporation on the Exchange of Power Agreement leaving a balance of 3,650,100 KWH which, with the line losses, of 548,805 KWH, or 15%, deducted shows a total consumption of 3,101,295 KWH as against a total of 2,904,445 KWH in 1937-38, or an increase of 6.7%. The actual amount of electrical energy generated by the two University Hydraulic Plants during the year 1938-39 was 5,573,400 KWH or about 2/10 of 1% less than the previous year.

An increase of 2.7% will be noted in the fuel consumption this year over that of a year ago. This has been caused mainly by the additional areas to be heated brought about by the acquisition of the Potato Greenhouses, New Service Building, Moore Laboratory and the Insectary.

Due to the fact that during the year 1938-39, the contract price of fuel was \$1.90 throughout the entire year and that the previous year was on the basis of \$1.70 and \$1.90, an increase is shown in the cost of fuel this year over last of approximately 10%.

The apparent increase in the cost of fuel to other departments has been the result of the addition of several places to which coal has been furnished that have not previously been included in the above statement and some of these places are not so arranged so that they are able to use the lower priced sizes.

\* In previous years the pounds of steam produced per pound of coal has been computed on the line flow. It has this year, however, been based on the boiler flow. This results in about a 15% increase over the previous year. An analysis of the above figures shows that with an increase in fuel consumption of 1%, the steam production has been increased by 5.7%. The steam consumption has been increased by 4/10 of 1% while the degree days remain about the same as a year ago. The pounds of steam per pound of coal, however, has been increased a nominal amount but would have shown a much greater increase providing tests on other grades of coal had not been run during the months of July, August and September.

It is interesting to note that over a five year period, the fuel consumption has increased by 6.6% with an increase in steam production of 7.7%. The consumption on the State Campus shows an increase of 6.8% while that on the Endowed Campus shows 6.4% with an increase in total consumption of 6.5%. A decrease in degree days over the same period of time is recorded as 4.4%. On the basis of the previous method of computation, the pounds of steam per pound of coal shows a decrease of approximately 3.6%.

## REPORT OF THE MANAGER OF PURCHASES

*To the Comptroller:*

Buying policy during the last fiscal year has not been materially effected by commodity price changes. While there has been a slight drop in the general index, this has been almost entirely due to weakness in agricultural products, and increases have about balanced decreases in the lines in which the University is interested. During the year, however, every purchasing department has had to realize that governmental influence has had an increased effect on their problems. Labor legislation in the form of the Wages and Hours Law, the so-called Fair Trade Laws and a greatly increased enforcement of the Sherman Anti-Trust Act, coupled with the Robinson Patman restrictions have all made it imperative that the purchasing office be alert and informed regarding what may or may not be legal. Too often, unjustifiable price increases are blamed on one or more of these governmental restrictions. The Robinson Patman Act, however, does not apply to purchases made by educational institutions and the evil of identical bids is gradually being overcome through citation by the Federal Trade Commission of firms and trade associations which, unjustifiably, maintain fixed prices. Consumer interest in price legislation, promoted solely for the benefit of interested groups of wholesalers and trade associations of retailed distributors, is waning.

The total volume of expenditures handled through the Purchasing Department increased over the previous year by about 13½%, or a little over \$150,000 to reach a total of \$1,277,580.00 which is the highest total since the Purchasing Department was established in 1921. The number of requisitions increased by 11.8% and the number of orders issued by 6.8%, bringing the total of requisitions handled by the Purchasing Department to nearly 30,000. Through the operation of a Central Stores and through standardization as far as it can be effected, it is the constant effort of the Purchasing Department to reduce the number of orders issued in proportion to the volume of purchases, in other words, to increase the average expenditure per order. It is interesting to note that during this last year, the percentage of increase in the number of orders was only about half of the percentage of increase of the volume of purchases and the average expenditure per order increased from \$56.25 to \$59.81.

The dollar volume of issues from College Stores has again shown an increase over the previous year; the total being \$182,532.11 as against \$168,474.45 for the previous year. The inventory in College Stores showed a slight increase from \$38,000 to \$42,000 due largely to a sizable increase in the number of items in stock. This was caused by taking over many Buildings and Grounds supply items, coincident with the move to the new Stores and Service Building.

The new Service Building was occupied in December, thus eliminating the use of Morse Hall and providing a much larger and more serviceable area, both for College Stores and the various service departments of Buildings and Grounds which were moved to the same building. This Service Building also provides a place for the mailing room for the University Official Publications, the responsibility for which has been turned over to the Purchasing Department and is operated through College Stores. All supplies for the Buildings and Grounds Department are now stocked or purchased by College Stores which has also absorbed the accounting for all purchases made by Buildings and Grounds and its various service departments.

The Chemical Stores issues for the fiscal year amounted to \$31,763.66 which amount of course does not include the constant issue and return of returnable items to students in the various laboratories. The number of student desks has been steadily increased, thus adding somewhat to the Chemical Stores Inventory, but constant progress has been made in the improvement of the items for issue to the student, thus cutting down materially the reconditioning of supplies previously necessary during the Summer months. An improved dispensing apparatus has

been installed in the Acid Room making it unnecessary to tilt the carboys and materially reducing the spillage and hazard. A partial rearrangement of stock has also increased the facility in issuing items both to the Chemistry Department and other laboratories throughout the University.

The University Print Shop has increased its volume of business from \$22,700.00 to \$23,900.00 during the year and arrangements are being made for additional equipment which will include a folder, perforator and offset spray gun. These will be installed during the Summer and will enable the Print Shop to handle certain items which it has not been able to provide in the past.

The volume of business handled by the Typewriter Division has increased during the year from \$10,830.54 to \$14,181.74 and represents practically all of the purchases, repairs and maintenance for typewriters, mimeographs, dictaphones and many other office machines throughout the University. The new location in the Service Building provides a great improvement in space and facilities over the previous room in Morse Hall.

The University Messenger Service has added several additional stops to its route and has periodically rearranged its schedule in order to provide for the maximum number of deliveries and the most direct routing.

In December, 1938 there was established a Salvage Department for the purpose of locating and disposing of obsolete or unused equipment and supplies located throughout the University. In general, the various departments of the University have cooperated wholeheartedly in assisting this department in cleaning up attics, cellars, storage rooms, etc. of such material, which was moved to the old Storeroom space in Morse Hall and either reassigned to other departments or sold outright. Many items which were of no use to the University have been disposed of, several areas which were fire hazards have been cleaned up and a very substantial amount of equipment has been transferred to departments where it could be used. While the Purchasing Department has been directly responsible for the operation of this Department, its policy has been determined by a committee consisting of the Treasurer, the Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds and the Manager of Purchases. Since the bulk of salvageable material has been located, it is believed that the continuation of this Department can be best handled as an adjunct of Care of Buildings and it is proposed to place the responsibility for the Salvage Department under that heading.

During the Summer of 1938 practically all of the equipment for the new Veterinary Laboratory was purchased and installed and the building was put into use with the opening of the Fall term.

The research laboratory maintained in Baker Laboratory by the Purchasing Department has been of particular value during this past year and comparative tests have been made on several items, such as anti-freeze compounds, floor waxes, penetrating seals, paper, paint, laboratory items, etc. Such tests and comparisons form the basis for standardization with its consequent advantages.

The relationship between the Purchasing Department and the various State Departments in Albany has continued to be cordial and cooperative, although sudden changes in several procedures just before the end of the year made it rather difficult to comply with all of the regulations and at the same time maintain an efficient schedule of purchases and payments of vouchers. A new type of purchase form is being adopted for next year for all purchases made from State appropriations and all State purchase orders for the Agricultural Experiment Station in Geneva will be issued through the Purchasing Department in Morrill Hall. This will facilitate the maintenance of uniformity both in procedure and policy and should centralize and improve the relationships with the various departments in Albany.

There has been during the year a continued affiliation and cooperation with the Educational Buyers Association through which a close contact is kept with the procedures and problems of some three hundred other colleges and universities throughout the country. The services and releases of the National Association of Purchasing Agents obtained through our membership in that organization are of great value in keeping abreast of governmental regulations, economic conditions, commodity prices and business conditions.

Following this report is a summary showing the number of requisitions handled, the number of purchase orders issued, the amount of expenditure through purchase orders, and the total amount of issues from the Storerooms and Duplicating Room. These figures do not include certain contracts for which purchase orders are not issued. Also attached are statements of orders placed for the State and Endowed Colleges and a summary of requisitions received during the year.

School District Superintendents and officers attending the summer conference "Facing the Problems of Youth" were housed at 516 University Avenue and Balch Halls, August 4 to 6, 1938.

Two hundred seventy-five Grange lecturers from five eastern states were housed in Balch Halls while attending their meeting August 16 to 20th.

A group of psychologists meeting at Cornell, December 28-31 was housed at 15 East Avenue.

Forty-seven delegates attending the state meetings of the Parent Teachers' Association held at Martha Van Rensselaer Hall from April 16 to 21 were housed at 722 University Avenue and Balch Halls.

Delegates attending the Model Student Assembly from April 27-29, 1939 were housed at 722 University Avenue and as guests of students in both the men's and the women's dormitories.

Women attending the Conference in Child Development and Parent Education were accommodated at Balch from May 22 to 26.

All of the dormitories and cottages were filled to capacity by the Reunion and Senior Week guests June 15 to 19th.

Women attending the meetings of the Garden Club held at the Plant Science Building June 21 to 24th were housed at 15 East Avenue.

One thousand and fifty boys and girls attending the 4-H Club Congress, June 25 to 29 were housed in the dormitories. The girls occupied 5 East Avenue, 15 East Avenue, 516 University Avenue and Sage and Risley Halls. The boys lived at Cascadilla, North and South Baker Halls.

During the college year 229 students were regularly employed in the dining rooms of the dormitories and Willard Straight Hall receiving in return their board. In addition to this 195 students were employed part time receiving a fixed wage per hour.

The house at 722 University Avenue was remodelled and used to house women students the first term. The University rented and furnished the house at 410 Dryden Road to house women during the college year.

The house at 15 East Avenue was refurnished and used to house women.

At 1 East Avenue part of the second floor was remodelled.

The first floor of Risley Cottage was remodelled affording accommodations for two additional students.

In North Baker and Baker Tower the hot water lines throughout both buildings have been replaced.

The usual painting and redecorating in all buildings has been done where necessary.

In the Sage College kitchen Monel sinks and more stainless steel equipment has been added. A large ventilating fan has been installed in the pantry. A portable silver burnisher has been added to the equipment and a modern slicing machine to the meat market equipment.

In Risley Hall more stainless steel equipment has been provided.

In Balch Halls the dining room furniture has been refinshed. The employees' dining rooms and locker rooms have been painted.

We are still handicapped by the lack of adequate refrigerated storage for meats and other foods. We hope to have this storage provided within the coming year.

# REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE COMSTOCK PUBLISHING COMPANY, INCORPORATED

To the Comptroller:

The conduct of the business of the Comstock Publishing Company, Inc. during the fiscal year 1938-1939 has gone on with gratifying success. It has been a year of investment as well as of sales of books already published.

The year has seen the completed revision and publication of Anna Botsford Comstock's *Handbook of Nature Study*. This new 24th edition has been put in a more attractive format and, while retaining the fundamental character as Mrs. Comstock created it, many new illustrations have been added and changes made to adapt it more fully to the various regions in which it is used—that is, to the whole civilized world. One of the special improvements is an up-to-date bibliography in which annotations are added to show the special character of the publication and the school grade in which it would be most helpful.

To show the appreciation in which Mrs. Comstock's book is held, already since publication of the new edition in February (1939) 4,000 copies were sold before the end of the fiscal year, and as this is being written an order for 200 copies to be sent to the Philippines has been received. The numerous reviews have been not only favorable, but highly enthusiastic.

Besides the new edition of the *Handbook of Nature Study*, four wholly new books have been brought into the Comstock group:

1. Dr. Paul R. Needham's book on Trout Streams.
2. Dr. H. J. Quayle's *Insects of Citrus and Other Subtropical Fruits*.
3. *Conservation in the United States*, by Gustafson, Ries, Guise and Hamilton.
4. Dr. A. A. Allen's second volume of *Bird Biographies*. 5,000 copies of this were printed for the Company, and 7,000 for the Junior Literary Guild.

All of the new works have been well received, and the sales so far have justified the expense involved in bringing them out.

It will be seen from the auditor's report that even in this investment period there has been a net-profit for the Company.

It gives me pleasure to be able to assert that in carrying on the business of the University Press without expense to the Press, and in seeing to the business of the Comstock Publishing Company, Inc., the manager of sales, Mr. Wm. Stanley Schaefer, and his assistants have been most efficient.
