The chief business of every adult now is to do what he or she can for the country. The question for each to answer is, What does my country need of me? But often, perhaps usually, the country's greatest need is for service which seems commonplace and humdrum, like increasing the food supply or decreasing waste or changing one's standards of living by cutting off non-essentials. Often, too, the greatest need is that one should continue for a time to prepare for more effective service later on. We must go on the theory that the war will last for years and will call for steady currents of persons trained in divers ways. It is wasteful for one in the midst of training for rendering expert service a year or two hence, as engineer, chemist, doctor, veterinarian or farm manager, to stop now in order to enlist as a private or to enter some line not connected with that training. Far better is it to wait and let the government, after surveying the whole field, decide in what way one can do the most for the country. This is the advice we receive from Washington and Albany and the opinion held by the colleagues whom I have consulted. We recognize that it is hard for an impatient youth to take this long look ahead, but unless we can do that we are not really educated men and women. In this case surely it is true that "they also serve who only stand and wait."
