I am happy to report that the reception to the new format for the Traveler, was universally favorable. When the idea was first conceived last Spring, we wondered how you would react to the change. We could not have been more pleased with your support, more recommendations were received for rushing and more alumni attended our alumni weekend party than ever before.

Your renewed interest has reflected itself in the undergraduate members. With fifteen graduating last spring we were left with only twenty-five active members and five holdover pledges; however, when rushing started these thirty entered the fight with the other fifty-one fraternities on the hill and showed such spirit and enthusiasm that everyone concerned was amazed.
