❖❖ Don't forget this annual event, sponsored by the Departments of Plant Pathology and Entomology, which has been scheduled for September 5–6 this year. All those interested are invited to attend this preliminary presentation of results of field trials on the control of diseases and insects attacking N.Y. fruit crops. Results will be discussed from experiments on tree fruits and grapes. First in Highland, the tour of research plots will take place on Wednesday, September 5. On Thursday, September 6, the activities shift to the Geneva Station, where there will be presentations on disease and arthropod control in tree fruits and grapes. Registration begins at the Hudson Valley Laboratory in Highland at 8:30 (Wednesday, September 6) and at Barton Laboratory, NYSAES, Geneva at 8:30 (Thursday, September 6). See you there.

approved the expanded registration of Pyramite 60WS for the control of mites on all stone fruit crops including apricots, cherries, nectarines, peaches, plums and prunes. This label change pertains to all of New York State except for Long Island (Nassau and Suffolk Counties), owing to the Department's concerns regarding the potential for groundwater contamination. Product use rates are the same as those already established in apples and pears (maximum of 2 applications at 2.2 oz/100 gal for European red mite; 3.3 oz/100 gal for two spotted spider mites). Pre-harvest intervals are: 7 days for peaches, nectarines, plums and prunes; postharvest only (300 days PHI) in apricots and cherries. **
