CONSERVING THE SOIL

District representatives of the Soil Conservation Service and County Agricultural Agents from many parts of the state, met at the Experiment Station on Friday morning to take a look at the field brome cover crop experiments. As reported in the April issue of FARM RESEARCH, this important grass is being advocated as a semi-permanent cover in cherry and peach orchards where a permanent sod may be detrimental to tree growth. The Soil Conservation people spent the morning at the Station and then traveled to Wolcott to observe further trials. From this point, the SCS will work with growers who intend to undertake the practice.

VISITORS

The Seed Production Class of the Agricultural and Technical School at Farming-dale came to the Station last Wednesday to study seed inspection technics in the Seed Laboratories....On Thursday, a group of high school pupils from the Bloomfield Central School paid a short visit to the Museum, Greenhouses, Seed Labs, and Insect-rearing Labs at the Station....Today, a group from the Williamson Central School will make a similar tour, and tomorrow, a dozen patients from the Canandaigua Veterans Administration Hospital will spend part of the afternoon seeing the Station.

BALLOTING RESULTS

There are indications that a recount may be demanded as the result of balloting which has just been completed by the Station staff. The position to be filled is that of Representative to the Agricultural Council for the College of Agriculture and Experiment Stations. The Council serves in an advisory capacity to the Cornell Board of Trustees. The names of Professors Luckett and Sayre appeared on the ballot and Teller K. D. Brase announces that 52 ballots were cast. One of these was ruled invalid and the final tally gave 27 votes to the Veg Crops Head, 24 to the Editor. A roll call by states may be the next move.
