# NEW PROFESSOR IN FOOD SCIENCE

Dr. Reginald Walter has accepted a position as assistant professor of food science in our Department of Food Science and Technology effective September 1. Dr. Walter's responsibilities will be to conduct research primarily in regard to pesticides

and pesticide residues, but he also will have the opportunity to work in research areas such as chemical degradation and odor control in waste

disposal from food processing plants.

He is originally from Antigua, West Indies, and before coming to Cornell, Dr. Walter has worked at the University of Puerto Rico and most recently for International Flavors and Fragrances. He has a strong background in food and analytical chemistry and a broad interest in food science with flavor research, carbohydrates, lipids, proteins, and pesticides being his fields of primary interest.

He received his B.S. degree from Tuskegee Institute in 1960 and his M.S. degree from the same institute in 1964. He was conferred his Ph.D. degree from the University of Massachusetts in the

field of food technology in 1966.

Dr. Walter was the recipient of the James Foundation Grant for Study at Cornell in 1960-1961 and a Carver Lecturer at Tuskegee Institute in 1968. He is a member of the American Chemical Society, the Institute of Food Technologists, and Sigma Xi.

He is married and has two children, Karen and Kim. The family is living at 659 Castle Street,

Geneva.

#### **NEW RESEARCH ASSOCIATES**

Dr. Clinton Kawanishi has been appointed a research associate in Entomology to work with Haruo Tashiro on a National Science Foundation grant for studies of growth and sporulation of milky disease bacteria. Dr. Kawanishi received his B.A. and M.S. degrees from the University of Hawaii in 1961 and 1966 respectively and his Ph.D. degree from Purdue University in the field of entomology this year. He has been a research assistant at both the University of Hawaii and Purdue University before coming to Geneva. He has specialized training and knowledge of insect pathology which will be most helpful with his work on milky diseases of grubs. He is a member of the American Institute of Biological Sciences, Society for Invertebrate Pathology, Entomological Society of America, and Sigma Xi. He is married and has two children.

Dr. Christopher Field is a new research associate in Food Science and Technology working with Keith Steinkraus as part of the same grant under which Dr. Kawanishi is being paid. Dr. Field comes to the Station from the University of Chicago where he was a Post Doctoral Fellow conducting research on the physiology of *Bacillus*.
