NEWS FROM ABROAD

Below are excerpts from letters of three ILRers abroad on sabbatical leaves:

From Great Britain where Professor Wayne Hodges, wife and youngest daughter are spending the summer: "My interviews in England were excellent. All respondents were friendly, frank and helpful. Several had us to their homes, including at a country home with thatched roof...This happy summer consists of much more than working-mainly knowing London, Paris, and the English countryside. Our Peugeot goes manfully under the full Hodges burden, despite its tendency to run on the right when it should be on the left. By American standards English theatre is excellent and inexpensive and we average three or four plays or concerts a week...Here are two postscripts to the itinerary: two weeks in Ireland after we leave Edinburgh September 2, then a week's return to London."

From Geneva where Robert Raimon and family are spending the year:
"For a week we are staying at a swank flat with two swimming pools overlooking all of Geneva. The flat belongs to an Indian princess, no less--the Princess of Palanpur. My kids will all be blase before they reach puberty...

"I've joined the International Tennis Club and now Geneva is a splendid place. It's easier to get a game here than at Cornell..You'd love our (working) hours - 8:45 to 6:16 p.m...Every time I try to go some place by car I get lost and see new things."

The Raimon's address is 22 bis Ch. Vert, Pinchat-Carouge, Switzerland.

From The Hague, where the Windmuller family is spending a year:
"We are now established in a third and fourth floor walkup apartment quite close to the center of town...The children are in the American section of the International School where standards seem to be a bit higher than in Ithaca...The weather for the last three weeks has been phenomenally good for a country known for its overcast skies and almost daily rain.

"Tomorrow is a big day here: Prinsjesdag, the opening of Parliament with a speech from The Throne by the Queen. I have the almost unique privilege of a seat in the Ridderzaal (the chamber used by the Lower House), thanks to my Senatorial colleague."

During August Professor Harrison Trice conducted seminars on alcoholism in Georgia and Florida.


