FRUIT TESTERS MEET SEPTEMBER 18

This coming Thursday, the New York State Fruit Testing Cooperative Association holds its 51st Annual Meeting in the auditorium of Jordan Hall. The usual fruit displays and a special panel displaying the new fall-bearing red raspberry, Heritage, are being prepared.

Dr. L. F. Hough, professor of pomology at Rutgers University, will be keynote

speaker.

Dr. Hough is a native of Michigan and received his undergraduate training at Michigan State College. He received his master's degree from Cornell University in 1939 and his doctorate degree from the University of Illinois in 1947. For a time he was associated with Cornell University, later with the University of Illinois, and since 1948 has been at Rutgers University.

This distinguished scientist spent a year in Liberia in 1952-53 as part of the U. S. Foreign Agricultural Service program and also spent part of 1960 in Yugoslavia. He is a recipient of the coveted Gourley Award and is a member of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, the Society for Horticultural Science, the Genetics Society, and the Phytopathology Society.

Dr. Hough's specialty is fruit breeding, particularly breeding for disease resistance. While in Geneva, he plans to discuss with members of the Fruit Testing Association the fruit breeding program in New Jersey.

Other business at the annual meeting of the association includes the naming of a new fall-bearing red raspberry, Heritage, and reports of fruit breeding progress by various members of the Geneva Station staff. Following lunch, tours are planned of the various fruit farms on the Station and will include visits to the rootstock farm, a look at new and promising apple selections, pears, plums, grapes, and small fruits.

The New York State Fruit Testing Cooperative Association, Inc. was organized in 1918 for the purpose of introducing for testing new fruits recommended as worthy of trial by the New York State Agricultural Experiment Station. It is not part of the Geneva Station and receives no appropriations for operations.

Its nearly 5,000 members located throughout the world serve as a testing board for new and promising fruit varieties that the Station wants tested under a wide range of climatic and geographic conditions. The members grow, test, and report to the association on these new varieties, and as a result of this program, the Station pomologists are afforded an excellent opportunity to determine whether a test variety should be named and recommended as a potential new commercial fruit variety.

Each year, the association publishes a catalogue listing the strong and weak points of the many new fruits being evaluated at the Station. Currently, the association offers apple and pear varieties on size-controlling or semi-dwarf rootstocks to induce early bearing and to hasten evaluation; grapes are grafted on stocks resistant to phylloxera and nematodes; and virus free strawberries, cherries, and raspberries are being offered.

William Blackburn of Medina, New York is president of the association.
