

supervision of the Department of Plant Pathology at Cornell which will make use of house No. 1 here at the Station. The experiments will include tubers known to contain leafroll, mosaic, and spindle tuber viruses to be compared with healthy stock. Observations will also be made on the use of artificial lighting and on different planting distances. Representing the Seed Improvement Association in the preliminary planning for the project were H. J. Evans, Georgetown Harry Andrews, Waterloo; Bruce Jones, Hall; A. G. Allen, Waterville; Roy A. Porter, Elba; and A. M. Koon, Auburn, all members of the Association's Greenhouse Committee. For the College, the conferees included Dr. C. E. F. Guterman, Dr. K. H. Fernow, Dr. M. F. Barrus, Dr. M. B. Linn, and Dr. M. F. Massey. The work is expected to get under way about Nov. 10th with the Division of Vegetable Crops here supervising the greenhouse operations.
