

CVM Animal Health Hackathon!



Our College is partnering with Entrepreneurship at Cornell
(http://eship.cornell.edu/) to host the first ever Animal Health Hackathon in the world!

This epic event on January 27, 28 & 29, 2017 on our campus, starts with a conference on Friday - education and inspiration - followed by a weekend of creation.

Our hackathon will bring together students from across degrees, majors, and schools at Cornell, as well as guests from other universities, forming diverse teams to create solutions to current needs in veterinary health care. A hackathon celebrates hacking in its most positive context - using minimal resources and maximum brain power to create outside-the-box solutions ("hacks") in a constrained time frame. Hack + Marathon = Hackathon.

Teams comprised of veterinary students, business students, engineers, and designers come together to create holistic, viable solutions, and compete for

accolades and awards. Mentors will provide feedback and guidance to teams, culminating in a project showcase on Sunday and final demos to an audience of peers, industry reps, and participants. A panel of judges selects winners. Projects may be related to software, hardware, wearables, business models, medical innovations, animal welfare and husbandry solutions, or needs of not-for-profit organizations' the sky's the limit.

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Hospital for animals to celebrate National Veterinary Technician Week

When a beloved animal is sick or injured, the person you want to see is a veterinarian. This is especially true at the Cornell University Hospital for Animals (CUHA), where primary-care veterinarians send their patients for advanced diagnostics, surgery and treatment.

So you may not notice the team behind the veterinarian, but they notice you. The person who schedules your appointment; the one you check in with; the pharmacist who fills your prescriptions; the clerk in Records who makes sure full patient information is at the veterinarian's fingertips before meeting with you – all do their best to make a difficult situation run as smoothly as possible.

October 16–22 is National Veterinary Technician Week (NVTW). In New York State, <u>Licensed Veterinary Technicians</u> (LVT) must spend two-to-four years in a college-level veterinary technology program and pass a national exam in order to obtain a license, and complete continuing education courses to maintain it. LVTs work side-by-side with veterinarians to manage client communication and patient care. An LVT's responsibilities might include placing intravenous catheters, monitoring anesthesia, administering chemotherapy and all aspects of patient comfort – and at CUHA, a patient can be as small as a hamster or as big as a camel.

CUHA celebrates LVTW by showing special appreciation for the entire staff. In addition to the examples cited above, there are animal care attendants and veterinary assistants who monitor in-patients, hold large and small animals for exams and take hospitalized dogs for walks; custodians who keep the property clean and in good working order; warehouse employees who restock equipment and supplies; people who manage discharge procedures and billing, and HR professionals who see to the needs of everyone else.

None of these staff members diagnose or treat animals, but oncology LVT Laura Barlow says their work is critically important: "These are aspects of running a hospital that we can't live without." Then there are the Night Owls. CUHA is open all year, around-the-clock, caring for hospitalized animals and emergency cases. That means that in addition to LVTs

and emergency veterinarians, someone has to be there after hours to check in new patients and someone has to clean up after them.

"I am thankful for the dedication and excellence that all of our staff, house officers and faculty model for our veterinary students every single day," says CUHA Director Dr. Meg Thompson.

Most CUHA employees could work in other businesses. Why do they choose to work in an animal hospital? Barlow says CUHA staff members share a love of animals, but that's only half the equation. "We also want to be able to provide compassion for owners," she says. "We are owner advocates as well as animal advocates. And owners need compassion, much more so today because their animals are part of their families."

Diversity: 2 Important Talks by Author Joe Gerstandt



Speaker: Joe Gerstandt, author and diversity consultant

Inclusion by Design (all welcome; faculty and staff focus)

While we continue to bring greater diversity into our workforce, we still have a great deal of work to do in delivering an inclusive work experience. The depressingly titled Harvard Business Review article "Fear of Being Different Stifles Talent" is just one piece of evidence. At the very root of this disconnect is the reality that inside most organizations today, while inclusion is an increasingly popular idea, it remains a vague, abstract idea involving some notions of

tolerance and respect, fairly vague and abstract concepts on their own. This makes it very difficult (maybe impossible) to determine what to do towards inclusion and what to measure.

Making the concept of inclusion more tangible, more actionable and measurable makes it much easier to actually deliver an inclusive employee experience, impacting individual and collective performance, as well as employee outcomes.

Joe Gerstandt has helped leaders and organizations, across industry, geography and size find new clarity regarding diversity and inclusion, put new practices in place and realize greater outcomes.

GOT BIAS? Understanding the New Science of Bias (all welcome; student focus)

Much of what is said and done in the name of diversity and inclusion today is, unfortunately, based on an antiquated and flawed mindset. We stubbornly cling to the idea that there are generally two groups of people in the world; there are "good people," who are open-minded, nonjudgmental and free of bias, and then there are "bad people," who are closed-minded, judgmental and dripping with bias. This conveniently leaves most of us completely out of the conversation regarding bias, as long as I am a "good person," I don't have any work to do, beyond helping to point out the bad ones.

We know enough today about human beings, specifically the human brain, to know that there is no such thing as a nonjudgmental human being. We are naturally and even automatically judgmental, there is no hatred or fear required. Bias is not necessarily a good thing or a bad thing, it is simply a true thing, and only becomes a problem when we convince ourselves it is not there. Having an accurate understanding of what bias is and where it comes from, allows us to do something about it, to make sure that we are mitigating its impact on our decisions and interactions.

This is an interactive, information-rich and incredibly actionable workshop.

Participants will:

- Understand what bias and unconscious (or implicit) bias are.
- Be introduced to research from the fields of social psychology, behavioral economics and neuroscience regarding the source and impacts of unconscious (or implicit) bias.
- Understand why bias is a natural aspect of the human experience.
- Understand and explore the ways that unconscious (or implicit) bias can undermine individual and group performance in the workplace.
- Leave with individual action items that they can immediately incorporate into their work.
- Identify collective opportunities for taking action to reduce the impact of unconscious (or implicit) bias.
- Leave with resources to support additional learning, sharing and action relative to mitigating the impact of unconscious (or implicit) bias.



What's happening and what's ahead?

Construction

- Construction for new Library/MRC/Dean's Suite wing continues scheduled for completion August 2017.
- Construction of the new cafeteria will continue scheduled for completion August 2017.
- Foundation and underground utilities for the Atrium, lecture halls and classrooms are being constructed - scheduled for completion August 2017.
- Slab-on-grade concrete is in process. Steel erection will begin this week.

VRT

- The new glass curtain wall assembly installation is in process scheduled for completion Fall 2016.
- 3rd floor office relocations have begun. Construction will begin October 3rd. Occupants will move back in on October 24th.
- The design efforts for levels 6 and 7 floor renovations are currently underway. Construction will tentatively begin in February/March 2017.

Community Practice Service Building

- This project is currently in the construction design phase.
- Demolition of the existing Poultry Virus Lab is scheduled for December 2016.
- Construction of the new building will begin in early 2017 scheduled for completion late fall 2017.
