Total of 403 Acacians Have Been Initiated At Cornell Chapter

Career of Walker '04 Reviewed in Second Of Feature Articles

Is Cornell Professor of Sanitary Engineering; Also Consultant

Charles L. Walker '04 is the principal of this, the second of a series of alumni feature stories, started in the last Traveler with an article on Carl E. Ladd '12. Brother Walker has been an Acacian since 1918.

Entering Cornell in 1900 from Buffalo high school, he received his degree in civil engineering in 1904. Immediately following his graduation he began his career as a teacher at Cornell, first becoming assistant professor of sanitary engineering, then a full professor, in which capacity he still continues. He is also secretary of the faculty of the engineering College.

Active As a Consultant

In addition to his work on the Hill, he has acted as a consultant on stream surveys in Maine for paper mills interested in water power; and more recently he made a tidal survey at Fernandina, Fla. He has also done research on the treatment and disposal of dairy wastes.

He served as a private consulting engineer for the Emergency Fleet Corp. in the construction of housing projects at Alliance and Lorain, Ohio, and at Wyandotte, Mich. He also assisted in building Camp Meade in Maryland.

Has Various Hobbies

In addition to such hobbies as gardening, stamp collecting, and nature studies, he is president of the Bryant Park Cine Association in Ithaca. He has served as president and member of the board of directors of the Ithaca Y. M. C. A. Married to Maude May Coleman, he has no children, is a member of many scientific and honorary societies, and lives at 201 Fairmount Avenue in Ithaca.
